Bill Hitchings was able to advise the Community Council, that the County Council had finally agreed to carry out the repair work to Anstey's Bank. NATURE NEWS

MY last scribbles were devoted to Canada Geese so a bit more about birds of other species this time. So many waders frequent our mudflats and tideline that one might make a long list of them. Far more to the point for the average onlooker is the clean beauty of their flight as they wheel, turn and dive. The multitude of their colours and shades in their plumage; from the oyster-catcher in its stark contrasts of black and white, flaunting that wonderful coral red bill, to the oil on water sheen on the wing of the Green Plover, or lapwing. Dunlin, Knot and Sandpiper bring a soft harmony of browns. Ducks in all their variety can be demure or dazzling depending on the particular species in question.

Nearer home the antics of the Siskins at the bird table give great pleasure and have enormous entertainment value as they cling and swing, acrobatically feeding on the nuts. These birds are here in the vicinity as I write these lines in mid-February. In colour they have resemblances to the Greenfinch but are smaller and more delicate in build. The male of the species has a great deal more yellow in his plumage than a male Greenfinch, whilst the female has a beautifully barred or striped breast in tinges of yellow, brown and grey. I think of them as one of the harbingers of spring.

An entirely different bird is the Cormorant. Commonly to be seen feeding in the waters of the Cleddau, or resting and drying their feathers as they stand or perch with wings spread out, in what is known as the heraldic position. I remember an incident at the stepping stones between Rectory Road and Guildford. Harry Parry of Mary's Cottage and I were chatting one summer's evening. A cormorant dived just below the Stepping Stones and re-appeared with a large eel in its beak. Naturally this was being held approximately in the centre of its length for the sake of balance. Stretched out it would have been somewhat longer than the Cormorant, how to turn it so as to eat it was the problem. We watched for some few minutes as the bird made various attempts to perform this feat.

Eventually it managed to turn its head first into its throat but owing to the length of eel involved it took an appreciable time before the eel was finally swallowed. The Cormorant then repeatedly dipped its head into the water to wash the considerable slime from its meal away. At last fully satisfied on every count it swam down the Pill. We went home almost as satisfied as the Cormorant.

Enjoy your local wildlife, its all around you in great variety.

ST. JEROME'S CHURCH, LLANGWM

From the Parish Magazine

In recent days there has been much comment in the sports pages of the newspapers lamenting the state of the 'beautiful game' - football. Games at the highest level are marred by dangerous tackles, violence off the ball, dissent and bad language and this is now beginning to affect the game of soccer at all levels right down to youth and school matches.

About 150 years ago in parts of South and West Wales our forbears would have been looking forward to games just like that. Shrove Tuesday was a day for sporting activities which would be banned during the season of Lent. Tales and traditions of Tenby 1858 speaks of two to three hundred players taking part. In 1838 in Laugharne the annual game was stopped by the magistrate because of the fighting associated with it.

A magazine 'By-Gones' 1858 reprinted an account of 1842 part of which went as follows:

"Every window in the town is shut by break of day at which time all the youths of the neighbourhood assemble in the streets. The ball is then thrown up in front of the town hall and the multitude divide into two and strive with incredible eagerness and enthusiasm to kick the football to the other extremity of the town. In the struggle several kicks and wounds are given and many fierce battles take place....The sport is kept up all day the hungry combatants recruiting their strength from time to time by copious horns of ale and an abundant supply of nice pancakes which women sell from baskets at the corner of every street. As a means of recreation it could probably only be played on a large scale on those days observed as festivals and on which no work was done."

By 1890 this custom was less widely practiced the one exception being Narbeth in Pembrokeshire.

Shrove Tuesday was celebrated with an air of festival about it. Welsh custom also emphasised the practice of eating up the last supplies of butter and fat in the form of pancakes. In many places the church bell would be rung at 11 o'clock as a signal to begin cooking the pancakes. In some

parts of Denbighshire it was the custom to postpone taking down the Christmas decorations until Pancake Day when they were burnt to cook the pancakes. The ringing of the church bell was a secular interpretation of the earlier custom of the religious practice of calling the parish to church for confession in preparation for Ash Wednesday and the solemn season of Lent. Shrovetide as its English name suggests was the period during which sins could be confessed and souls prepared for the solemnity of Lent. The popular secular activity of using it as a time of carnival indicated the serious way in which Lent was observed. Shrove Tuesday was the last opportunity to indulge in food and sporting activities forbidden in the solemn season. Times and fashions change. Shrove Tuesday is no longer a general holiday and our eating of pancakes but a pale memory of days gone by. The church still keeps Lent as a time for examining our consciences, and our Christian commitment in order to prepare for the glorious celebration of Easter. Yours in Christ, Gilbert Hooper. Rector.
