## LLANGWM COMMUNITY CENTRE.

The result of the public meeting held on Wednesday 4th April to decide whether the Llangwm Community Centre should exchange premises with the Llangwm Rugby and Cricket Social Club was as follows:

**149** ballot papers, **106** for the proposal, **41** against the proposal, **2** spoiled

The public meeting and vote were held in accordance with the regulations laid down in the Trust Deed of the Community Centre.

This resulted in **71.14%** voting in favour of the motion. As the Trust Deeds of the Community Centre state that **75%** must vote in favour, the motion was therefore not carried.

Something that we do in Llangwm anyway but there is more to this than that, advice on security both personal and property identifying problems and solving them. Statistics show that it can act as a deterrent and if it helps to make you feel more secure then maybe it is worth doing.

## COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

### Central heating installations

Council house residents are advised of Pembrokeshire County Councils policy in respect of new central heating installations. It is the County Council's intention that all properties in a given district are completed before installations commence in another. Bungalows would be converted first followed by houses. Tenants with medical problems are assessed on an individual basis.

### Youth Club

The community Council have agreed to sponsor two adults who have volunteered to act as Youth Leaders for the proposed re-opening of Llangwm Youth Club. The Council welcomed the initiative of all concerned in the re-opening of the club.

### Troopers Inn Junction

The Community council are still awaiting a decision from Pems County council on splay improvements at the junction. They advise that progress is being made albeit slowly. The Community council hoped that a decision would be made as soon as possible.

### Footpaths

Further to the December 2000 item regarding changes of use from footpaths to Bridleways, it was thought ridiculous that the path from Guildford Bridge to Mill Street was also included, clarification from Pembrokeshire County Council was requested.

## LLANGWM GARDENING CLUB

Given by Roddy Milne, Head Gardener at Picton Castle, he spoke on the subject of exotic plants that grow well in Pembrokeshire. ## LLANGWM LONGBOAT ROWING CLUB

The Annual General Meeting of the Llangwm longboat Rowing Club was held on Friday 30th March when there was a good attendance of members. A new Committee was duly elected to include Chairman, Graham Stephens, Secretary, Fay Keppel-Compton, and Helen Stewart and Dave Cooke as Team Captains.

The membership of the club is increasing and needs to build on the successes of the past two years and to do this more boats are desperately needed. A lottery bid has been submitted for three new Celtic longboats including necessary equipment and trailers; the total cost of this is £18,000 and the club needs to raise 30% of this before April 2002, i.e. £5,400. This is an ambitious project but the keen interest of members justifies it.

There have been several fundraising activities since Christmas which have included a Winter Walk, Quiz Night, Anne Summers Party, and most popular of all, a Salsa evening. This last event was very successful and was ably run by Brenta Pearn and her assistants, and many members put their skills to the test on the dance floor. A "Cumberland Curry" evening is planned for April and other Events are in the pipeline. We are very grateful for the support that the village as a whole gives the Club.

We have received a grant of £1,000 from Menter Preseli and with other promises and our Fundraising we now have £3,500 towards the total; we therefore have high hopes of raising the additional £1,900 before the deadline. If the bid is successful, the new boats will not of course be delivered till 2002 so this season members are having to make do with the current club boats and borrowing others as necessary. This is not a very satisfactory situation as there are currently 7 crews who wish to race, but it is born of success and demand and members live in expectation of better things next year.

There is a full calendar of races and challenge events lined up for this year. Three Club members had hoped to join with Neyland to row the Irish Sea, in the Annual Celtic Challenge event but unfortunately this has been cancelled. The Regatta at Black Tar is scheduled for the last day in the Llangwm Festival on 15th July and the Triathlon event, (rowing, cycling and running), is on the 1st Sept. For the Cleddau Race on 20th. May, the teams have agreed to find sponsorship for "CLIC", which is a charity devoted to combating cancer and Leukaemia in children; Adam James is providing the sponsorship forms for anyone interested in supporting this worthwhile cause.

Those who have not yet tried their hand at rowing may join crews on most Saturday mornings at 10am. Visitors are insured for their first trial row, and having enjoyed their trip, would need to join the Club in order to continue. ## RECIPE

### BANANA and WALNUT LOAF

Do try this at home

4oz butter or margarine. 4oz soft light brown sugar. 3 eggs beaten. 3 large bananas, mashed. 1tsp lemon juice. 8oz sieved self-raising flour. Half-teaspoon ground cinnamon. Half teaspoon of ground nutmeg. 3oz walnuts, chopped.

Set your oven temperature to 180 degrees C, cream butter and sugar till light, gradually beat in the eggs. Add bananas and lemon juice, blending well. Fold in flour, spices and walnuts. Pour into a prepared tin and cook in the centre of the oven for one hour or an hour and a quarter. Leave to cool for five minutes turn out of the tin and leave till cooled completely.
