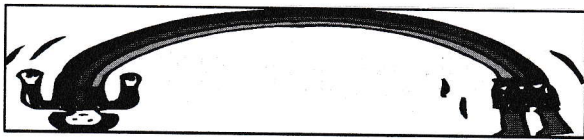

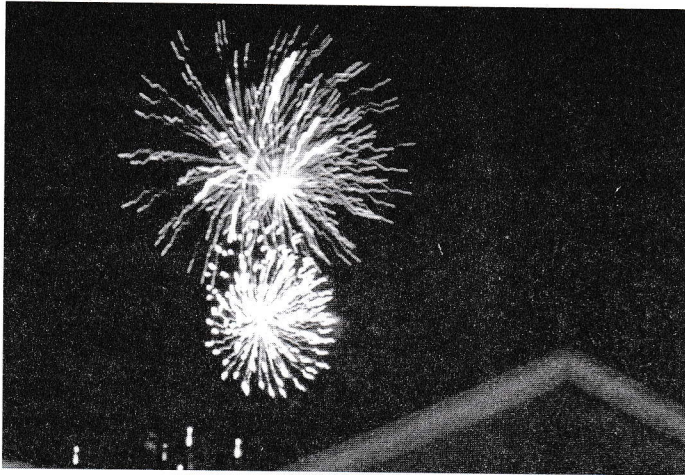

Of course Santa could not miss Llangwm Village from

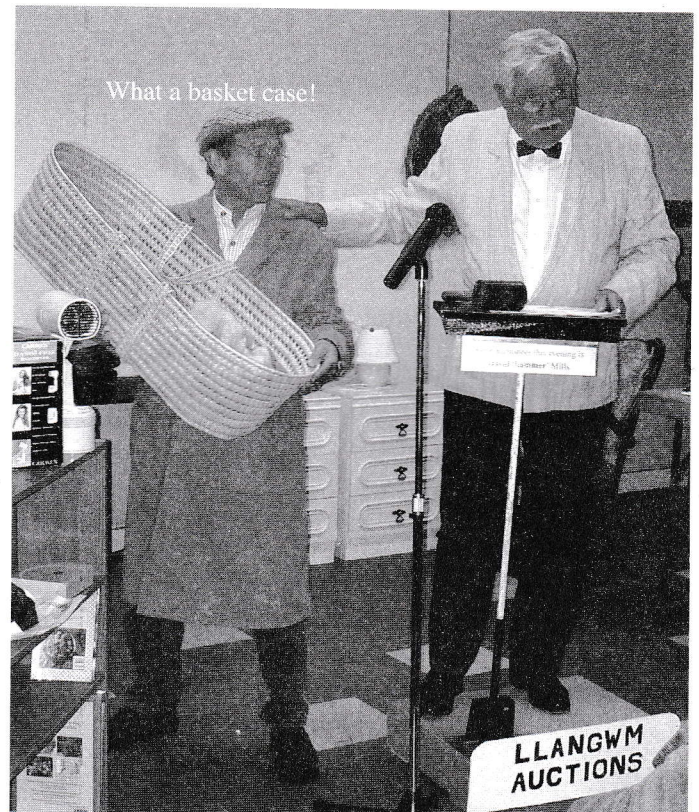
the sky this year with all the twinkly Christmas lights everywhere.

Top Honour for Llangwm's Olympic Chief

January 2006 heralded a great announcement for **Llangwm** – one of its favourite sons, **Richard Palmer**, was awarded the CBE in the New Year Honours List, for the major part he played in the 2012 Olympic Bid.

Working from both London and Singapore (and Deerland, Llangwm) Richard had been part of the team who helped secure the Games for London – you may have noticed him on TV just after the bid was announced being hugged by a jubilant Denise Lewis, the sprinter!

Richard has worked for the Olympic Movement for many years, latterly as *Chef de Mission*, organising the teams in all aspects from travel to trainers, telecommunications to tracksuits! His strongest lasting memory is of the time he marched alone bearing the British flag at the much-boycotted Moscow Olympics 1980, when it was decided that the team would not parade around the stadium in the Opening Ceremony.

He is currently adding his organisational expertise to the Commonwealth Games in Australia. Many congratulations go to Richard, who will receive his honour later this year at Buckingham Palace.

School Admissions—apply NOW for school next year.

An announcement from the Education Department at Pembrokeshire County Council advises parents about the importance of applying in advance to register your child's name at the school you wish your child to attend.

If your child is due to start school between January 2007 and December 2007, you must apply in writing to the school by 30 April 2006 (this month).

Application forms are available from the school, on the Pembrokeshire County Council website (www.pembrokeshire.gov.uk), or from County Hall, Haverfordwest.

Maintenance Hotline

If you spot anything in the village that needs fixing, replacing, clearing or removing, the number to ring is 0845 6021386

That's the hotline to PCC's Maintenance/Works Department, who process all calls of this nature, and set works in motion.

If it is a broken or mis-timed street light, try to take details of the reference number – all lamp posts carry this now. If it is a blocked drain, please have accurate directions ready, for the Council to locate it.

Recycle All you Can!

Apart from seeing bin bags torn open by animals overnight (PLEASE don't put them out too soon...) there's nothing quite so demoralising as seeing rubbish inside them which COULD HAVE BEEN RECYCLED. Please help everyone avoid the problems of refuse landfill disposal by separating out all cans (steel and aluminium), plastic bottles (but not plastic cartons), newspapers and magazines, paper and cardboard for your ORANGE BAGS - as well as taking glass bottles to the bottle bank at the Recycling Point in Nash Lane, on the road to town.

Keep Llangwm Tidy!

Please also endeavour to keep the streets and roadsides clear of litter, and keep the village tidy, particularly for the forthcoming busy summer season. It will be much appreciated if you take your litter home with you, or at the very least use the litter bins which are provided at key points around the village - thanks.

Stay Warm in Winter

Of interest to anyone feeling the cold particularly keenly this winter are the Heating and Insulation Grants of up to £1,500 or £2,700 if you qualify under the terms of the Home Energy Efficiency Scheme funded by the Welsh Assembly Government.

Householders (owners and tenants) can apply to upgrade their present heating systems (including central heating, radiators, solid fuel conversions, storage heating, hot water, cavity wall and loft insulation, and general draught-proofing).

Conditions that apply include: if you're in receipt of Income Support, Housing Benefit, Council Tax Benefit, State Pension Credit, Jobseeker's Allowance, Maternity Benefit, Attendance Allowance or Disability Benefits.

Freephone **0800 316 2815** to find out if you might qualify.

Fire Safety Help and Advice

To develop fire safety awareness and reduce the risk of fire

accidents in your home, you can ask for a free home check-up to be carried out by the professionals.

The Community Fire Safety Department of the Mid and West Wales Fire Service is offering an audit of your house, which should take no longer than about half an hour, to make you aware of any potential trouble-spots, or risks you may be running.

If necessary, they are able to provide you with free smoke alarms, not to mention general good advice.

Ring **0800 389 9279** to make use of this worthwhile service.

I have been asked by the Community Council to stress the importance of driving safely and sensibly in all areas of our village. One particular stretch causing concern at this time is that between the Kilns and Nash Farm. This country road is governed by a speed limit of 60m.p.h. though in most circumstances that figure is unrealistic and excessive. The potential danger of this stretch of road has increased of late because of the installation of the recycling centre. Though the development has been enthusiastically welcomed it does mean that traffic turning in and moving out of it can present problems if care is not taken. We would therefore respectfully ask all drivers to be mindful of this and to exercise extra caution on this stretch of road. Local residents have, quite rightly, made representations to the Community Council and we fully support their entirely legitimate point of view. Many thanks.

WHY NOT JOIN THE "TUESDAY CLUB"?

Not everyone is aware that there is a lively, friendly group of Senior Citizens from Llangwm and Hook who meet on a weekly basis.

Every other Tuesday they meet up at Hook Social Club, at 2.30p.m, for a get-together, while in the intervening weeks, every alternate Wednesday, they go across to the Stable Bar in Burton, for a two to three course lunch, at around 12 noon.

Transport is provided, subsidised by Pembrokeshire County Council, so each get-together is at a reasonable price. Funds cover the cost of the bus to the Tuesday meeting, and it costs just £2 on Wednesdays, from your doorstep to and from the Stable Bar.

The Tuesday meeting in Hook is £1 (with £1 initial membership), the Wednesday lunch (main course and pudding) is just £3, with an extra 50p if you want tea or coffee afterwards.

In the summer holidays they organise outings to places around the county, through Edwards Brothers bus company of Tiers Cross, and there are special meetings at Christmastime, too.

We have talked before with regard to the health benefits of the sport for the young and old alike. We will also try to accommodate any persons wishing to row or join the club who have any form of disability.

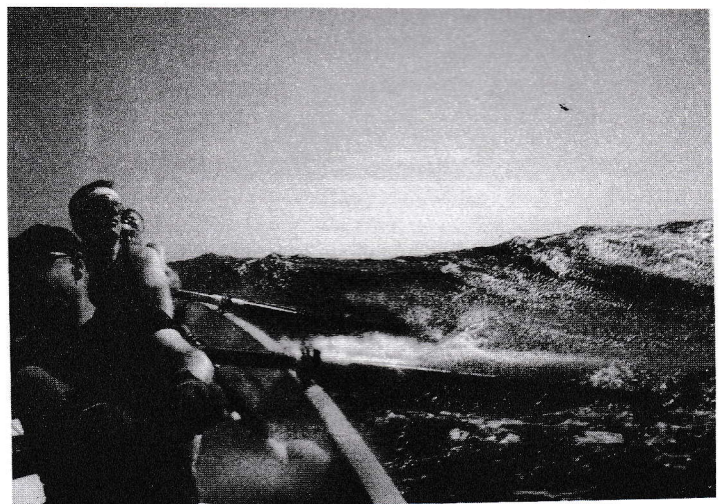

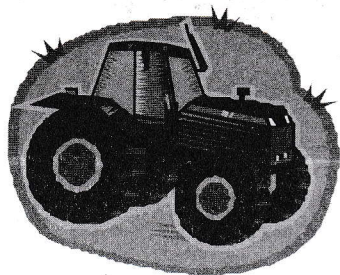

FARM DIARY



Whilst watching the last tonne of Wheat pour into the lorry and travel up the road to go to a mill somewhere in the world (it might go as far as Egypt) I wondered how much food it actually made.

I found out that 1 hectare of Wheat (which is virtually the same size as the inside of a 400metre athletics circuit) is enough to keep the population of Llangwm in bread for about 3 or 4 weeks or put another way it would feed a family of 4 with enough bread for about 15 years. That's if the average person has 3 decent meals a day, but for those of you who have 5 I would need to alter the figures! Another strange thing about all this is that a loaf of bread costs about 60pence but its main ingredient costs only 11p to produce.

The average person eats 105kg of spuds a year (4 big bags). So enough potatoes (400 tonnes) leave this farm every year to keep all the people of Llangwm chomping spuds for at least a 2 years and a bit, in fact if we were feeling kind some of those spuds we could share with Hook. No, thought you wouldn't agree with that idea...

And a really important one. I don't know how many pints of beer a tonne of Barley produces but I think we produce 27 million pints of beer every day in the UK every year and it uses around 7 million tonnes of Barley as its main ingredient. So I think a tonne of Barley produces a few thousand pints. Anybody fancy homebrewing with 200 tonnes of Barley?! "

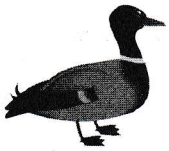

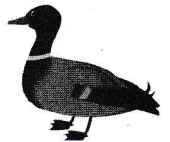

NATURE NOTES By Graham Brace WINTER WILDLIFE



They promised us a hard winter and, by golly, we've had it! Consistent low temperatures with lots of frosts have brought an abundance of birds to our shores and surrounding countryside and delayed the onset of spring flowering.

The Pill at times has been teeming with birds in larger numbers than we've seen for many years... *teal*, *mallard*, *shelduck* (51 counted one morning), *redshank*, *dunlin*, *curlew*, *lapwing*...as well as the conspicuous flocks of *Canada geese* (accompanied occasionally by the 2 *snow geese* that have been around this area for many years) and the ever present *little egrets*. Other wildfowl and waders seen frequently include *dabchick*, *wigeon*, *snipe* and *oyster catchers*.

Our single *spotted redshank* is still with us since returning from its breeding ground last July. In early February I saw another lovely specimen at close quarters at Landshipping Quay. This one was much paler than the individual that frequents our Pill.

The large numbers and extended presence of winter thrushes, *fieldfares* and in particular, *redwings*, bears testament to the cold winter. We still have redwings in our garden daily.

Although we've had *primroses* flowering in our garden since before Christmas, the *daffodils* are much later. Last year we saw our first *celandines* and *blackthorn* break into flower on 14th January. It is now 13th March and there are only a small number of *celandines* braving the elements and no sign of *blackthorn* blossom.

The *lapwings* (*green plover*) this winter have been present around the Pill sometimes in flocks of 300 plus. Young Beth Meopham enjoyed watching a dozen or so in the field behind her house at Black Tar just after Christmas. These lovely birds when not lining the water's edge, calling in their distinctively plaintive and melancholic fashion, seem to take great delight in their powers of flight and aerobatics...soaring and tumbling in flocks around the area often at great heights and frequently in mixed company with *golden plover* and, as I've witnessed several times, *dunlin*.

I have often marvelled at the way that flocks of birds like plovers and waders behave when in

flight...sometimes hundreds of individuals twisting, turning and changing direction simultaneously as one body. What amazing powers enable them to do this? Is it some form of telepathy or do they possess such an acute sensitivity which enables them to react collectively in nano-seconds? If that's the case which member of the flock initiates the manoeuvres? Whatever wonderful ability it is, it most definitely transcends different species because you can also witness this phenomenon happening in mixed flocks.

Thank you to all those who take the time to report sightings to me. Before Christmas Ian Jacob spent an exciting few minutes watching a *fox* select, stalk and kill a *Canada goose* that was feeding in a flock in a field at Black Tar.

Other notable sightings include...

In mid January a *goshawk* was identified overflying Chapel Row; a *stonechat* was seen on a couple of occasions near Troopers Inn; 2 *chiffchaffs* in a garden at Black Tar and Lake Villas; *blackcaps* and *siskins* have been seen on garden feeders at Gail Rise (a flock of *siskins* was also seen in early March in the conifers at Pill Parks); flocks of *goldfinches* and on one occasion a flock of *linnets* have been seen around the shore on the Cunnigar; In February, *bramblings* visited garden feeders in Main Street and Butterhill; a *moorhen* was seen in the stream by Guildford Bridge; for several weeks now a *great spotted woodpecker* has been heard 'drilling' almost daily in trees near Knapp Farm and I saw it in flight one morning. We have had several visits of late from a *nuthatch* (to our feeder) and a lovely male *bullfinch* (picking the dried seeds off the honeysuckle outside our kitchen window).

Back in late November I saw (and heard) a bird, which I first thought was a hedge sparrow, singing atop a blackthorn tree behind our house. Closer inspection showed that it was a large warbler. I am sure it was a *garden warbler* but what on earth was it doing there at that time of year?

then the Lord will take me"

"In silence she suffered, with
patience she bore,
Till God took her home to suffer no more"

"Sad and weary with my longing,
filled with shame because of sin,
As I am in conscious weakness,
here I would salvation win"

And, finally, there is an urn engraved with the words

"Remembrance from his workmates,
Pembroke Dock".

Unfortunately, there is no record of the deceased's name and no headstone for this grave.

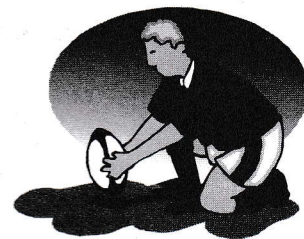

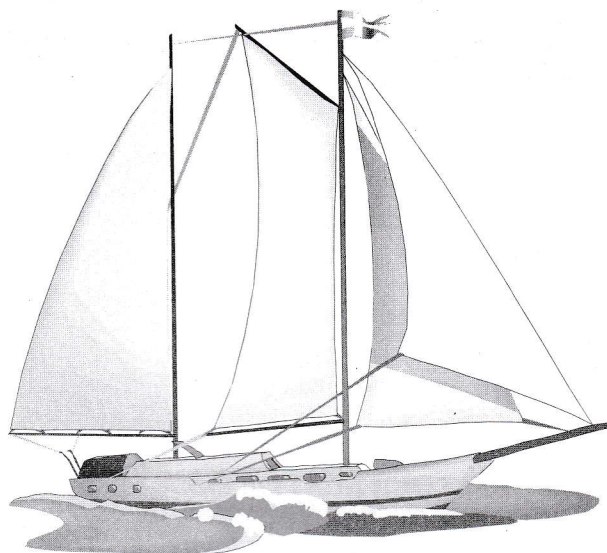

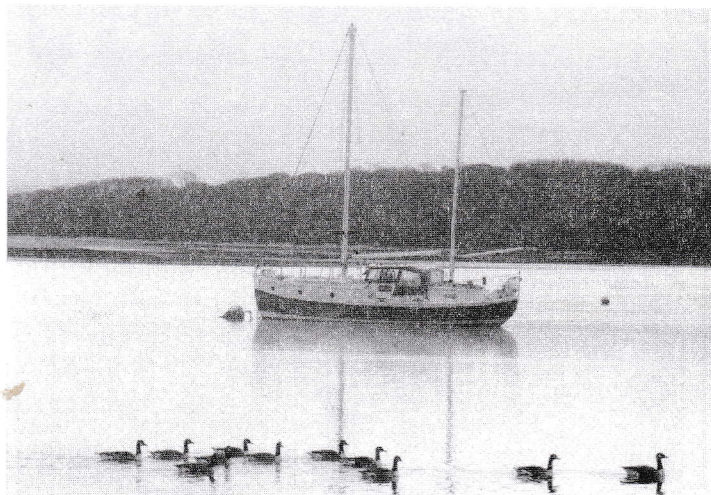
