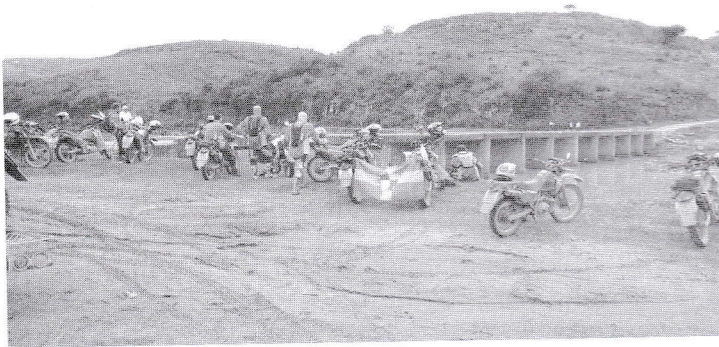


## Enduro Africa—The Ride for Life

Since the last issue of the Llangwm Newsletter, I have taken part in and successfully completed **Enduro Africa**.

On collecting our motorcycles from Durban, we set off south on route to Port Elizabeth. Little did I know how physically and mentally demanding this trip would be.

Riding on dirt track roads which were more pothole than road, at speeds in excess of 80 kph, maximum concentration is needed. Up gorges full of boulders, through forests, rivers, sand dunes, friendly villages and some very unfriendly townships.



It was after a fuel stop at Willowvale, (a township of extreme poverty, unlike anything I have ever seen), that five minutes after our departure our driver was robbed at knifepoint. This brought home to us that we were in a lot more danger than any of us realised, but we carried on regardless and just put it to the back of



Over the next few days, the riding conditions got tougher, with accidents seeming to be a regular occurrence. Some were just minor 'offs' (me included), and some more serious. Four members of my team crashed heavily over a period of two days, all ending up under the surgeon's knife. This made me think "what am I doing here, but if I've got this far then I have to finish".

On the last day we rode out to **Lapa Game Reserve**—what an incredible feeling, riding a motorcycle through a game reserve—so much wildlife. We then rode into Port Elizabeth where we picked up with the local police, who escorted us into the city and to our destination, the Pine Lodge.



What a feeling of elation to have survived - I was really looking forward to having a few beers with my fellow riders. It was an epic journey, but never to be repeated. Hopefully, what I have done will make a big difference to people's lives over the years to come, with the medical aid these bikes will assist in delivering.

A big **THANK YOU** to all the people who have supported me and to the **Llangwm Rowing Club** for getting me fit. **Cheers Guys.**

### LLANGWM LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

Following the summer break, our Local History Society has had two excellent visits; the first was to Hayston Hall, where we were shown an amazing collection of old vehicles and all sorts of memorabilia by Neville & Hilary Pugh. Our grateful thanks to them for opening their collection to us and for giving us such an excellent evening. October saw us at the Reference Library in Haverfordwest where Local History Librarian, George Edwards, and his team produced a fascinating array of photographs, documents, newspaper cuttings and books concerning Llangwm. We were given a great evening and an invitation to return as a group or as individuals to conduct further research into all things related to Llangwm.

Our November meeting featured a talk on "Bringing History to Television" given by Pam Hunt. Pam's experience as a BBC producer and latterly with her own production company, showed the changing way that history has been portrayed on television over the years, how ideas for historical programmes get translated into TV items and how to spot the very latest techniques in computer generated images—of air battles for example.

A date for your diary once all the Christmas festivities are over will be Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> January when Charlotte New, the Museum Collections Officer from Scolton Manor, will be bringing a collection of strange and amusing objects for us to identify. Some of these items are bound to produce some extraordinary suggestions as to their actual function and there will be a prize for the best (or most ludicrous) suggestion. This will be a social and fun evening to which everyone is welcome.

Our delight at receiving a grant from the Pembrokeshire Small Grants Scheme continues as we now have a cupboard in the Village Hall in which to house our local archive. ## Llangwm place names: what do they mean?

*The Gail* – narrow lane

*Knap* – small hillock

*Sprinkle* – a spring

*Black Tar* – black rock

*Hook* – a spur of land or bend in the river

*The Lays or Leys* – fallow land [i.e. temporarily uncultivated]

*The Kilns* – a furnace for removing water from limestone to make lime suitable for use as manure on agricultural land

*Pill* – a tidal creek

*Troopers Inn* – a pub used by cavalry [soldiers on horseback]

And – to be controversial – *Llangwm* – an enclosure around a church dedicated to Saint Jerome. There are three villages in Wales named Llangwm, all three have churches dedicated to St Jerome and I believe that they are the only churches in Wales dedicated to St Jerome. ['Gwm' being a corruption of the name 'Jerome'.]

If you enjoyed the last recommendation (the McCall Smith novel based in Botswana), how about something completely different?

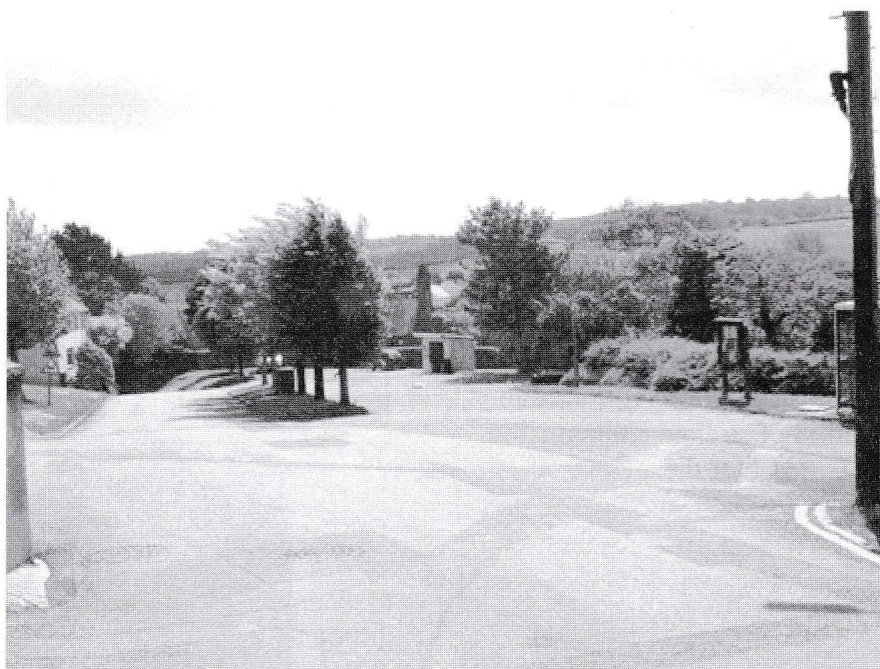

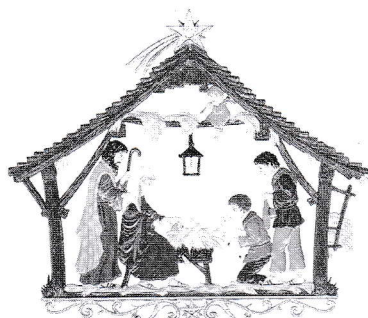
We are delighted that Rev. Jane is making such a good recovery from her recent operation. We look forward to her recommencing her duties in the near future.

## ANOTHER BRICK IN THE WALL

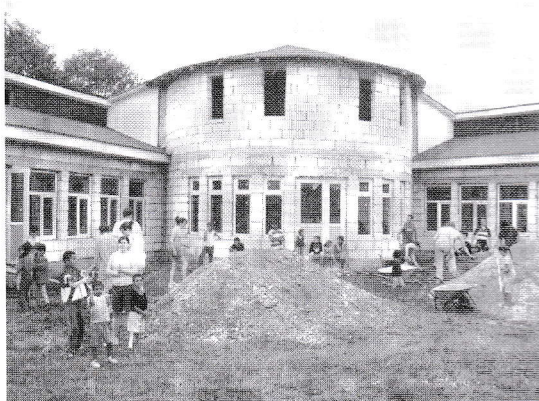
Deprived children living in the village of Baia Mare in Romania are now going to a brand new school, thanks to the efforts of Pembrokeshire volunteers including 17-year-old Kate McLoughlin of Guildford, Llangwm.

Kate, a pupil of Tasker Milward, travelled to Romania this summer with fifty other young people from all over the county, to help build the badly-needed school. She decided to go after Taskers received a letter from organiser Bob Inglesant, looking for volunteers.

In late July, having raised £500 to pay for the trip, she was on a bus with 50 other young people from all over Pembrokeshire, including five others from Taskers. After two and a half days on the bus, stopping in Budapest, Hungary, on the way, they arrived at Baia Mare.

Her first impressions were pretty negative. "We travelled through back roads and got there at about 6 pm when it was quite dark; we couldn't see much but what you could see was really bad," she said. "There were a few nice houses although they were all quite small, but most of them were scruffy flats, and a lot of them had burn marks on the fronts. It looked like it might be a really rough area in London or somewhere."

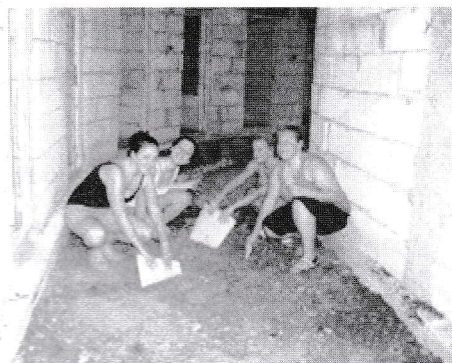
"Where we stayed was really weird. There were loads of stray dogs and cats which were really skinny. All the glass was broken in the windows of the building next to us, it wasn't very nice." The first morning saw the young people split into four groups and shown their different tasks. Some were taken to see the school, while some stayed to do the cooking for the day.



As Kate and her group were shown around the site of the new school, the gypsy children living nearby came to see them. "We could see where they lived; it was awful," she said. "The bricks in their houses looked like they were going to crumble." The children were mostly very friendly, with a few trying to impress the group by putting new outfits on every half hour - although a few others tried to pinch some of the group's cameras.

The volunteers' job was to help build a new school for the local children. The old school was a tiny, primitive building, housing between 30 and 40 children. The new building had four classrooms, indoor toilets, and a church which the community could use too.

The work was quite varied, ranging from plastering (Kate's personal favourite!) to cladding and electrical work. Much of the time was spent transporting stones by wheelbarrow into the school to fill deep holes in the ground, then flattening them down and covering them in cement.



As well as working, the volunteers socialised with the children and local community, with one of the focal points being a goat roast at the new school - which even the local mayor attended.

"The Romanians and the Romany gypsies didn't get on, so it was a chance to try and bring them together," said Kate. "We made a little stage; which was very pretty; and everyone took turns to sing or do some acts."



"I was really, really pleased when we had finished," she said. "I felt I had achieved something and that we had helped their community. I'd like to go back and see it one day. It was opened recently and I saw some photographs which looked really nice."



Kate is now in her final year of A-levels in Tasker Milward School, studying French, Drama and Art. Drama is her favourite (you may have seen her this summer in Vinegar Tom, a production by the Torch Theatre Summer School), and she is hoping to study the subject at university or acting school next year.

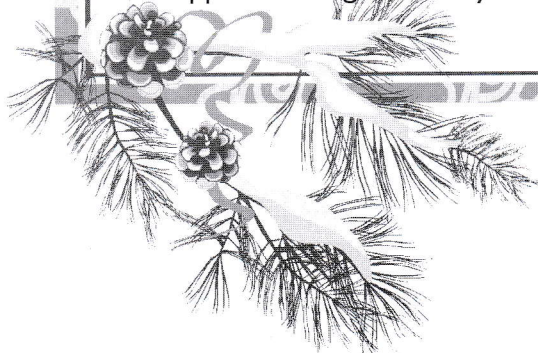

# Llangwm 'Autumnwatch'

Nature Report by Graham Brace

***This autumn - and what a beautiful, colourful autumn it has been - has seen the return of all the usual species of birds that normally frequent the Pill and adjacent shores outside the summer months.***

The teal were much later returning this year (first ones arrived in early September - all female) but didn't achieve their normal number until the middle of October. There are currently around 60 present. Small groups of shelduck are also to be seen most days.

Although we have pairs and small groups of mallard duck around for most of the year, this autumn has seen a large group congregate around the inlet and shores at Port Lion. In mid-September there were 36 individuals made up of a mixture of females, young and drakes in eclipse plumage - emerging into their full splendour by the end of September. Their numbers have increased until they peaked at 82 individuals on 9 November but most days there are between 45 and 55 present. Maybe they are being bred domestically somewhere in the locality and, having escaped, taken a shine to Port Lion.

***The Canada geese are still much in evidence with large flocks feeding on the fields behind Knapp Farm in the morning and groups of varying numbers moving up and down river between Garron Pill and Fowborough/Hook at various times during the day.***

The spotted redshank re-appeared in the Pill on 24 September and has been seen regularly ever since. When doing my Wetlands Bird Survey count on 7 October it stood out like a beacon amidst a group of 40 of its duller common cousins on top of a rock in the Pill.

Apart from curlew and dunlin other waders reported over the last two months are black tailed godwit, greenshank and whimbrel. A coot was seen in the Pill on 15 September and I have seen up to five dabchicks on a few occasions. Egrets are much in evidence with three birds being present at most times.

Lapwing numbers in and around the Pill vary daily but on 21st November there were approximately 120 along the waterline at Llangwm Ferry in the company of in excess of 150 dunlin.

***One highlight of my early morning walk on 11 October was seeing a superb kingfisher dive out of an oak tree on the Cunnigar into the high tide, catch and devour a small fish.***

Over the last month or so we have had a phenomenal amount of bird activity in our garden having been visited by pheasants (two females), flocks of Redwing making the most of the sloes and hawthorn berries, goldcrests, two bullfinches, marsh/coal/long-tailed/blue/and great tits, chaffinches, (unusually few) greenfinches (disease is taking its toll) and a great spotted woodpecker. The robins, song thrushes and blackbirds are ever present. At one point in early November there were 14 blackbirds in one corner of our garden trying to feed on windfall apples. Needless to say there was much chasing, scuffling and aggressive calling amongst them. At the same time and completely unperturbed by the bad tempered behaviour of the blackbirds was a beautiful fieldfare, also enjoying an apple. For a few nights a tawny owl has taken to sitting in one of our apple trees and hooting to the neighbourhood around midnight.

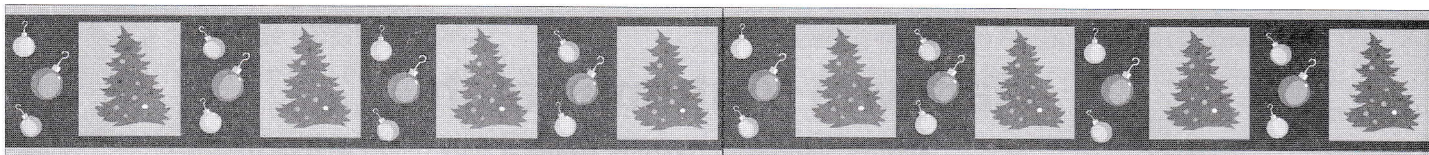
On 24 October Mike and Gill Bowmer found a beautiful woodcock dead on their garden path at the bottom of Butterhill. It was completely intact with no sign of any breakages or injury. It may well have died from exhaustion after migrating from Russia or Scandinavia. (Ronnie James of Hook, a knowledgeable countryman, reckoned that the four days prior to finding this bird had seen quite an influx of woodcock to the area).

***Mammal-wise...September and October showed no evidence of otter activity in and around the Pill but on 1<sup>st</sup> November I found fresh spraint on a sprinting site at Port Lion.***

On 17 September Vernon Davies of Pill Parks Way had an encounter with a polecat at the shore end of Dark Lane. His terrier dived into some undergrowth and came face to face with it. Apparently it retaliated and only retreated when Vernon pulled the terrier out of the undergrowth by its tail. The Polecat was well 'puffed up' and left behind an appalling deterrent odour before disappearing from sight.
