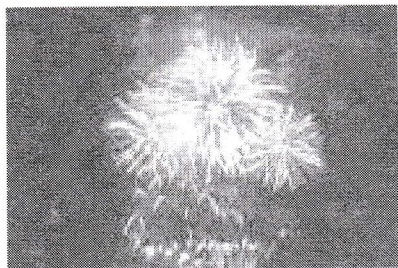

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Festive Fun and Fireworks



It's that time of year when our thoughts turn to lighting the fire and wrapping up warm for winter. But then you'd miss out on the events being organised by the Festival Committee this winter.

The first diary date is 12th December when at 7.00pm, **Father Christmas** will appear as if by magic on the Green. The event is much as in previous years with mulled wine, mince pies, lollies for the children, the lighting of the Christmas tree and carols with music provided by **Castle Brass**. Father Christmas will be there in his grotto waiting for the children to tell him what they want for Christmas. The evening will continue with the mince pies and mulled wine in the Rugby Club, (as in previous years, please donate mince pies or biscuits for this event—they can be given to a committee member or left at Llangwm shop). At 8.15 a concert by **Operaxposed** will take place in St. Jerome's.

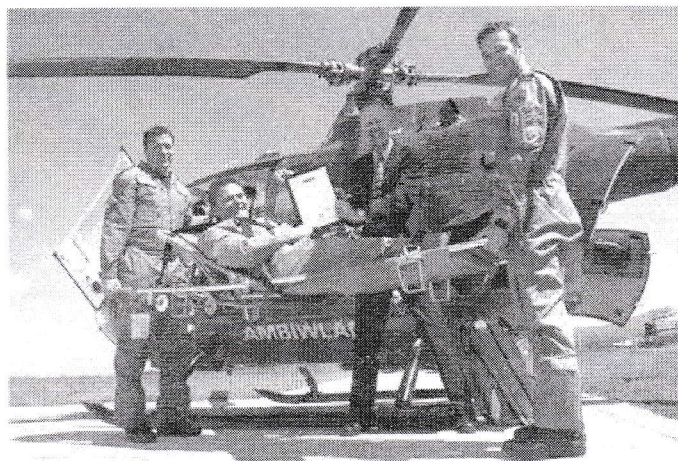
On **New Year's Day**, we will once again be having **fireworks on Pill Parks field at 6.30pm**. It is becoming more and more difficult to put on a firework display. It costs **£1,100** for just a 10 minute show and we have safety factors to consider. In recent years, support for this event has waned and as a result the committee dropped the fireworks in favour of a family treasure hunt and a party in the village hall last year. **It was decided to try it once more and see whether the fireworks event will get the support it really needs.** Entry is free, so the funding comes from money raised during the festival in June and July, at various events throughout the year and with volunteers rattling buckets at the firework event itself. **No personal fireworks or sparkers will be allowed during this event.**

Unfortunately, this year the festival was a washout and lost money, so the Committee is mounting a series of events and competitions over the next few months to try to raise the £1,100.00 needed to pay for the display.

On Friday, 31 October there was a very successful **Halloween Fancy Dress Disco** in the rugby club (see article and pictures opposite). Then on **November 17th** at 7.30pm, there was a pub quiz at The Cottage Inn which was as entertaining as ever, despite the small number of people entering.

Look out also for fund raising quiz sheets, which will soon be on sale in the shop. All the money raised will be going towards paying for the fireworks.

At the Father Christmas event and the Firework display, Festival Committee members will be seen around with fund raising buckets. Half the money raised in these buckets will go towards the fireworks and half to the **Wales Air Ambulance**.



Please be generous, this is not only supporting a very worthy cause, but the future of the firework displays in Llangwm depends on your support.



This year we have welcomed on to the Festival Committee several new members,: **Alison Brant**, who, along with partner **David**, has organised two quiz nights and worked very hard during festival week, **Racheal Price** and **Karen Brock** who organised the very successful Halloween Disco and have brought much energy and enthusiasm to our fundraising efforts and **Cheryl Newton**. High Hopes... The Raid Pyrenean

On Sept 15 2008 Phil Edwards and Bob Charles, two enthusiastic Llangwm cyclists, plus fellow Pembrokeshire cyclist, Alan Wheatley from the Rhos, begun their attempt of one of the 'must do' rides for any cycling fan; 'The Raid Pyrenean'. Established in 1950, the 720km (450 miles) route across the Pyrenees from Hendaye on the Atlantic coast to Cerbere on the Mediterranean coast was to feature 18 cols (mountains); some of which regularly feature in the *Tour de France*. To top it all, the route had to be completed in no more than 100 hours/four and a half days. Their preparation would be tested to the full. One regular training run for Phil and Bob was up Barn Hill, down to Port Lion Hill and back up. Bob holds the record of twelve times up and down both hills.

The challenge involved some long days in the saddle with some covering over one hundred miles. Other days were equally gruelling and included most of the biggest climbs in Pyrenees. These ranged from the infamous *Col de Tourmalet* (2115metres), *Col de Puymorens* (1915 metres) *Col de Aubisque* (1709 metres), the *Col de Peyresourde* (1569 metres) and the *Col d'Aspin* (1489 metres). As a little comparison Ben Nevis is 1344 metres! Our support driver, Alan's close friend, Hans, was vital as he drove our support vehicle and kept us well fed and watered; not an easy task. Thankfully too, he spoke fluent French and knew the area well.

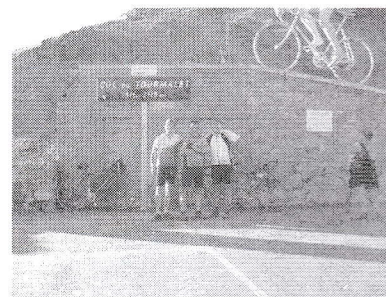


The scenery was stunning and the road surfaces and car drivers were accommodating to cyclists. We stayed at pre-arranged small hotels along the route that were very welcoming.

We were able to leave our bikes on the premises overnight; their hospitality certainly took the edge off our aching limbs and sore bottoms (the downside of long days on the road). We would usually start off at 8am and finish at approximately 7pm. With brilliant weather conditions we were extremely lucky and experienced the Pyrenees at their best. If anything it was too hot when we did some of the bigger climbs.



Our last day, Friday 19th September, was a 60 miles, reasonably flat route, from Prades to Cerbere on the Mediterranean Spanish border. We arrived at Cerbere around 12 noon. It had been a long slog and we were all happy to get off the bikes knowing tomorrow was a free day. We relaxed in Cerbere for the next twenty four hours, taking in some good food and drinks.



The following day we made our way back to Pau airport for the return flight to Bristol. Hans, our precious support driver, returned our hire car back to Biarritz; thankfully he lives not far away.

We organised the trip ourselves and completed it independently, but there are organised trips which run every year. Overall, the 'Raid' was a fantastic experience although I admit is not for everyone. However, if you are into long distance cycling and enjoy the mountains and a challenge, it is worth giving it some serious thought.

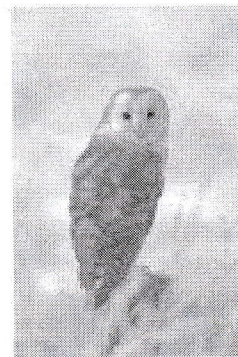
We will be holding our AGM in the New Year with Club Net Practice in April.

OWL'S WELL THAT ENDS WELL

On the morning of Sunday 26th October Graham and Beryl Thomas and their visitor Ron Lawrence were driving from Sardis to Troopers Inn when they noticed an injured bird in the hedge.

On close inspection it turned out to be a **Barn Owl**, which tried to fly away but flew directly into the hedge again. It could not see. There appeared to be some growths on its eyelids, so Graham, Beryl and Ron sought some help.



You may be interested to know what to do if you find an injured bird at any time. The procedure is as follows:-

A telephone call to the **RSPCA** (national 24-hour line 0300 1234 999) will offer advice. In this case they were put in touch with the **RSPCA duty vet**, who assessed the situation and advised them to take the owl to their **local veterinary practice** for treatment, for which the RSPCA is later billed. (Sometimes the RSPCA will issue callers with a reference number for the case, other times the local vet will ring for one.)

The owl was lucky - an **on-call vet** at the **Fenton veterinary practice** in Haverfordwest was telephoned, and said she happened to be in the surgery late that Sunday morning, so they were able to take the bird in straight away. 'Tics' were bathed out of the owl's eyes with tepid water - any other method of removal does more harm, apparently - and the owl was given much needed food and shelter.

Although the vet did not give too much hope for the owl's survival, a telephone call later in the week informed the rescuers that 'Barney' had come on well and was already at the **bird of prey refuge** near Amroth, which confirmed that the owl was indeed flitting around their kitchen and looking keen to get back out in the wild.

Llangwm Gardening Club News

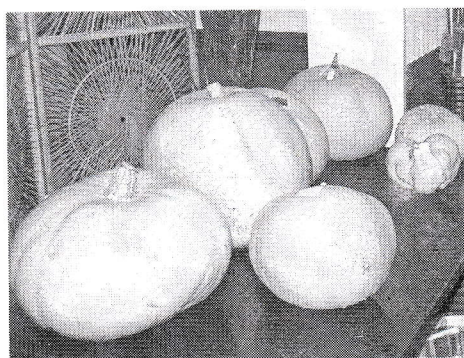

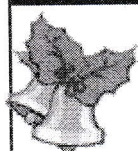
Gaynor is the elder daughter of Billy and Dorothy John of River View, and sister of Helen Carrington, of Gail Rise.

St. Jerome's Plans Ambitious New Concert Season

The concert season at St. Jerome's kicked off to a popular start with a concert given by the **Haverfordwest Ladies Choir** on October 10th. Several members of the choir are regulars at the church, so the concert had a special significance. We were also able to announce dates and artists for nearly all the concerts due to take place over the 2008 / 2009 season.

On 14th November at 8.00pm, the rafters echoed to the sound, this time, of the **Haverfordwest Male Voice Choir** with a concert for Remembrance Day and half the funds raised donated to The Royal British Legion. There was also a collection for **Children in Need** which raised approx £150.

Once again there will be a special concert for Christmas to coincide with Father Christmas's visit to the Green on 12th December. More of that in another column, but at 8.15pm **OperaXposed** will perform a concert of traditional favourites, humour and stories from backstage. This show is being support funded by the Night Out scheme provided by the Wales Arts Council and ticket prices are £7.50 for adults and £3.50 for children.

Concerts for early 2009 include **Mike Chant**, also known as the "Didgeridoo man" on January 30th at 7.30pm. Tickets for this concert will be £6.00 for adults and £3.00 for Children.

On March 6th 2009, a concert for St. David's Day will be performed by **Carys Ann Evans** on Harp and **Joy Cornock** singing and performing some traditional Welsh music.

St. Jerome's is a unique and a very special building and is Llangwm's oldest dating back to Norman times. The Women of Llangwm

It would appear that the women of Llangwm have always been a force to be reckoned with. The images of Llangwm fisherwomen are famous throughout the world.



It is common knowledge that **Mary Palmer** of Elm Cottage, Main Street, - at the age of 82 - refused to pay a special water rate when summoned to court in Haverfordwest. Another controversial figure was **Maria Shrubshall**, landlady of "The Black Horse" when the temperance movement was at its height.

In the 'Pembroke County Guardian' of 11th February 1916, the headline was "Butter Boycott - Llangwm women effect reduction by 6d". For a few weeks, the price of butter sold in Haverfordwest market had been increasing. The Llangwm women arrived early one Saturday and posted themselves at the entrance to the market, urging all purchasers to refuse to buy at the current prices. By one o'clock, the farmers' wives were forced to reduce the price of their butter. The newspapers commented "The secret of success lies in organised concerted action."

Another example of the power of Llangwm women had occurred in November 1914. The 'Pembroke County Guardian' reported that "An outbreak of fire took place in the shop of Mrs Palmer on Tuesday morning. Considerable damage was done, but a number of women were soon there and were able to extinguish the outbreak."

In the book entitled 'The History of Haverfordwest with that of some Pembrokeshire Parishes' originally written by John Brown of Haverfordwest in the 19th century, he wrote about Llangwm women - "Their husbands are kept under strict petticoat government". Coincidentally, he also noted that Llangwm "appears as Langein in a 12th century deed", but gave no precise source for this information.

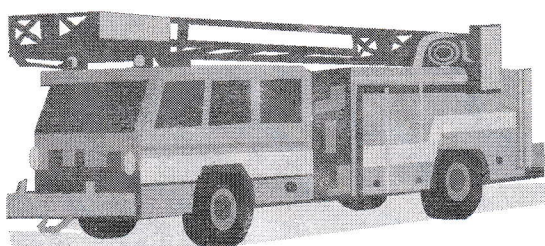

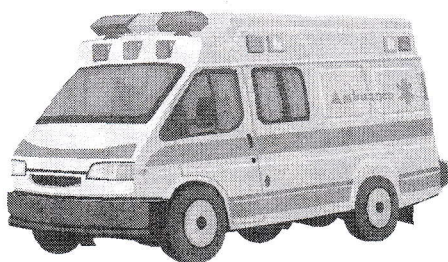

SeaFair

The Concept of SeaFair was that the Port Authority would meet the cost of any host port infrastructure and insurance, as well as contribute to hospitality costs for the visiting crews. Host Port committees were then asked to run the shore based aspects of their part of the Festival in whichever way they wished to benefit their communities and their visitors.

Here at Llangwm we had a particularly demanding task as we were hosting the **Sail and Oar Flotilla** whose crews needed to be accommodated ashore, and Black Tar lacked any infrastructure to begin with. Yet the Committee and host of helpers, encouraged by the support and forbearance of the whole community, managed to meet this task and achieve a "profit" of nearly £10,000.

Then came the really difficult part – how to disburse the takings. At a long meeting in the Village Hall, the Committee agreed to make donations only to village, non-profit making, clubs and institutions, and only those who were mainly dependent on the community for their income. It had always been intended that the major allocation should be to the **Pill Parks Grandstand Renovation**, not just because of the Rugby and Cricket Clubs' masterful stewardship of the SeaFair bar, but because the improved grandstand is intended to benefit all village sporting interests.

The one beneficiary that was not strictly local was the Pembrokeshire Gig Association. That was because the Committee were aware that attempts to fund the Gig was why SeaFair started in the first place, and because most of its people were too busy helping with the Festival to promote the Gig's interests.

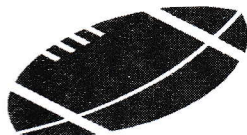

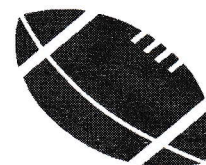
A small amount of money has been kept in reserve to cover possible future expenses prior to the next SeaFair event.

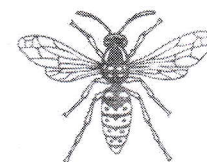

AUTUMN NATURE NOTES

As I write (31 October) autumn has rapidly deteriorated into winter with an unseasonal spell of very cold weather made all the more severe by a north easterly wind. We have already had three early morning frosts down here in the depths of Guildford.

Birdwise, the Pill is becoming increasingly busy as the winter residents move in. There appears to be more than our usual number of **redshank** (62 at last count). There are 50+ **mallard** present and **teal** numbers have been growing daily since mid-September. **Lapwing** are also beginning to arrive.

On 24 September I saw a single **spotted redshank** in the Pill and it is still around over a month later. I am assuming that it is the same individual that has wintered with us each year over the last four years.

The **Canada geese** which were around in large numbers from mid-August were suddenly conspicuous by their absence after an alleged shooting spree nearby in mid-September. However, if indeed they had been shot at they simply relocated temporarily to a stretch of river further downstream between Castle Reach and Burton. They are once again roosting in the Pill in fairly significant numbers.

The current cold snap has brought an influx of small birds to the garden, including **goldcrests** (6 at one count), **coal tits** and **marsh tits**, and this morning dozens of **redwings** and a few **fieldfares** were making the most of the abundant hawthorn berries.

There have been several unusual sightings in recent weeks. Derek John was very surprised to see a **Java Sparrow** cavorting with a flock of house sparrows in his Glanhafan garden on 10 September. Java Sparrows are very popular aviary birds and this one was enjoying a taste of freedom.

Graham Stephens was delighted to witness from his boat an **osprey** diving for fish on 20 September in Castle Reach. He also saw (and photographed) what appeared to be an unusual finch feeding in his garden on 27 October. To all intents and purposes it looked very much like a *Snow Finch* (a resident of the northern Mediterranean shores and southern Alps). However, greater authorities who have seen

his photographs think that it is probably an 'aberrant' *chaffinch*, but the jury is still out on this one.

On 28 October Graham saw two **Whooper Swans** flying upriver before turning inland in a westerly direction. These winter visitors which breed in the Arctic are distinguished from our resident Mute Swans by their yellow and black bills and the loud bugle-like whooping call usually made in flight. They favour coastal areas and are often present at the Gann near Dale and on Skomer over the winter.

This morning there was greater than normal bird activity around the Pill and a **little grebe** appeared off the Cunnigar together with an immature **great crested grebe** which proceeded to dive just 20 yards from where I was standing.

During the last week of September we had a few warm days and the ivy blossom in our hawthorn trees and last remnants of buddleia around our hedgebanks were covered with bees. Also present were numerous strikingly beautiful **red admiral** and **peacock butterflies**. While photographing these at close quarters I noticed a fine comma butterfly. These are less common than the other species mentioned and are very distinctive with their ragged-edged dark orange wings marked with brown spots.

I was surprised to note that at this late date (31 October) in the midst of this very cold spell there were two red admirals flitting around a beech hedge in the afternoon sun on Ferry Hill. Most of the red admirals that we see arrive from the Continent in early summer and breed. Of the ones that do not return to Europe in autumn some hibernate but most are killed off by the onset of cold winter weather.

Judging by the scarcity of spraint around the shore **otter** activity has been fairly low in the Llangwm area over the last few months.
