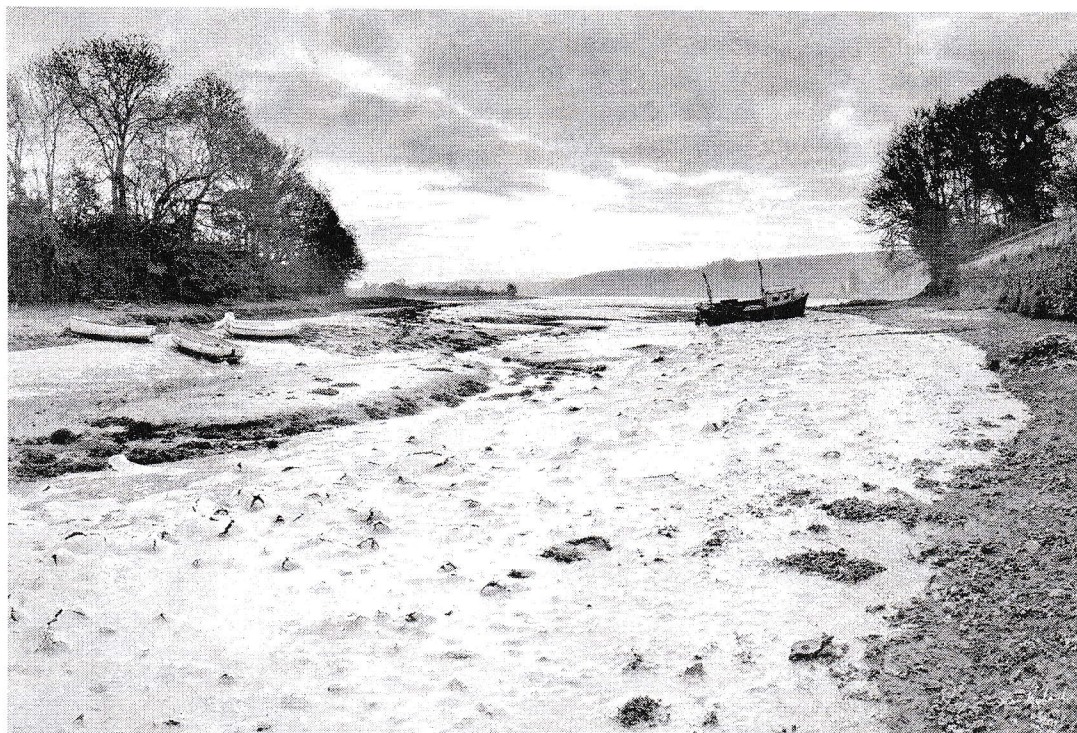

## 2009 Kicks Off With A Bang

Llangwm was able to welcome 2009 with a bang on New Year's Day with a wonderful firework show on Pill Parks field. A big **thank you** goes to **Mike Davies** for organising a very professional display and ensuring everyone's safety at this event.



The money raised in the buckets on the night and in LLangwm Shop totalled **£400**, all of which was donated to the **Wales Air Ambulance**. We were able to do this because of the amount raised in various events and donations received from the following: **Steven Thomas** (Deerland Road) £200, The Cottage Inn (£50), **St Jerome's Church** (£50). A heartfelt thanks goes out to the individuals and organisations making these donations.

A few weeks before, we celebrated the visit of Father Christmas in the Village Hall. New health & safety policies had necessitated a rethink of the event, so the Festival Committee looked into building a special grotto for Santa's visit to the village. Step forward **Ed and Sue Tanguay**, who designed and built a fantastic grotto. Many thanks to Ed and Sue and the people who helped in the construction of the grotto in the village hall.



With Christmas carols played by **Castle Brass**, free mulled wine, cakes and mince pies, the evening was greatly enjoyed by children and adults alike. Again, thank you to all those people who donated food, and to **Chevron** who sponsored the evening with a cheque for £250.



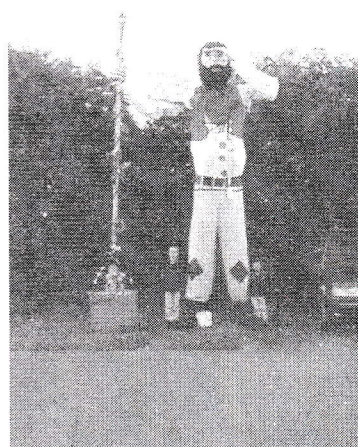
Santa was ably assisted by one of his elves, and he liked the grotto so much that he asked if he could use it again in the future. Of course, we said 'yes'.





Turning to this year's **Llangwm Festival**, there are big plans in hand for a very special **10<sup>th</sup> anniversary** event, which will be running from 27<sup>th</sup> June to 11<sup>th</sup> July.

**Chevron Oil Refinery** will this year be sponsoring and judging the **Scarecrow** competition and there will be **£400.00** in total prize money available for the best scarecrows. There will be no specific theme this year, just children and adult categories, so anything goes. Start thinking now how you might wow the judges. We hope this will renew interest in the scarecrows and encourage people to really get creative. The Mathias family from Glan Hafan will once again be producing one of their 'larger than life' scarecrows and the money collected from this will be donated to organisations within the village. For those of you who remember **Shrek** and **Hagrid** (see below), we anticipate that this year's will be just as amazing.



Watch out for the special 10th anniversary tea-toweis, depicting some of LLangwm's more famous scarecrews. These will be on sale before and during the festival fortnight.

Following the success of a marquee being used to provide entertainment for the 2007 festival, the

committee has successfully secured sponsorship from **Murco** and **Paul & Zoe** from the Old Bakery to have a larger marquee available from 2<sup>nd</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup> July. It will be the venue for many of the festival events, concerts, a **mid-summer dance**, a **comedy night** and especially for Llangwm's younger generation a **talent competition** (for which we are hoping to have a very well known judge) and a **disco**. On certain dates, the marquee will be available for use by other village organisations, for parties or other fund raising events. **Please contact a member of the festival committee to find out more.**

Llangwm's local **History Society** is organising an exhibition depicting the history of the village in the community hall and a highlight of that exhibition will be a buffet lunch and talk by **Rob Scourfield** on "Local Dialects and Folklore" on 4th July. St. Jerome's Church is planning an **exhibition of wedding dresses**, whilst the **Methodist Church** will once again offer its delicious teas throughout the fortnight. There will also be a **Horticultural Treasure Hunt** organised by the Llangwm Gardening Club and plans are underway for a "**Garden in a Tray**" competition for the children.

With all this and much, much more, we hope every one in the village will be catered for. So watch out for details, which will appear on posters, the village website and in the shop as the festival approaches.

It has always been the Festival Committee's aim to provide the village with events that are good value by keeping costs to a minimum without jeopardising the quality of the event or people's safety. To that end we will from April 1<sup>st</sup> this year be merging the Festival Committee with the Community Hall committee. The immediate effect of the merger means that both committees between them will save £600.00 annually in insurance costs and that the Festival Committee will enjoy the additional benefit of coming under the charitable status of the Community Hall's Committee. This also means that both sections of the new committee will be able to call on the other when they need extra people for their own events. In the end, Llangwm will be the undoubted beneficiary of this merger.

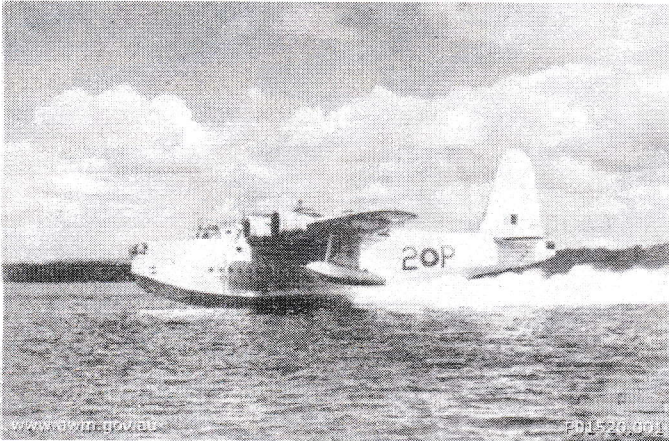

## Flights and Knights...

### LLANGWM LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

January and February saw local speakers come to the Society to talk about two fascinating topics. Firstly, **John Evans** held everyone enthralled with his description of flying boats on the **Haven**, particularly during the Second World War. For those who have heard him before, his encyclopaedic knowledge of names, dates and places was amazing. He and his colleagues have very kindly invited us to visit the new **Sunderland** centre once it has opened, to learn more about the project to raise the remains of a Sunderland from beneath the waters of the Haven.



Our second speaker was no less knowledgeable about a subject which has received massive publicity over recent years – that is, the **Knights Templar**. Numerous books and films about supposed Templar treasure and blood lines have fascinated people all over the world. However, **George Wright** laid to rest many of these legends and gave us the facts of Templar history. A founding member of a re-enactment society, he also brought along some of his fighting artefacts which are based on authentic Templar weapons.



Our March meeting will consist of our **Annual General Meeting**, followed by a discussion of **family history** – a subject with which more and more people are getting involved and, with the advent of the internet, are finding it easier to source family information.

Everyone is welcome to attend all the meetings of the Society and to take part in its activities. A date for your diary is **Tuesday, 7<sup>th</sup> April**. We are continually working to increase the amount of information in the Llangwm archive, which is being developed not only for the present but also for future generations. Please help us to increase our archive of local history by bringing along any photographs and documents of your family or relating to Llangwm, so that they can be copied for the archive. Any photographs or documents used in future exhibitions will be credited to the owner. Copying can be done on the spot using up to date scanning equipment within minutes and you will be able to take your photographs away with you that evening. Come along and see what is already in the archive, help identify individuals and places in existing items and enjoy a cup of tea & cake while you do so.

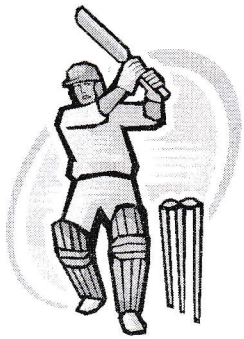
### From the international to the local...

Janet and I were lucky enough to be in **New York** on the day that the United States made history by electing its first black president. Following that great experience I was given, as a Christmas present, a copy of **Barack Obama's** autobiography '**Dreams of My Father**'. It is a fascinating read. Though too early to say what sort of a President he will make, one thing is certain – he is a very fine writer indeed and when his political career ends a new career will beckon. This book is well worth a few hours of anyone's time.

In early January we went for a walk round the shore and whilst talking to Mike Roberts along came Norman Roach. In the course of our chat Norman asked if I had read '**Below the Landsker**'. He strongly recommended it. After some difficulty Janet managed to get a copy and it was well worth the wait. It is particularly strong on the language heritage of this part of the world. Those who have lived in Llangwm for more years than they care to admit will be familiar with many, if not all, of the words, sadly, now no longer in use. A pleasing feature of this book is the number of times our village is mentioned. According to the Rev. Thomas Watts of Haverfordwest (which could explain a lot!) writing in 1861; 'I have lived among a heathen people, but I solemnly declare that I have never heard, even among an ignorant negro population, language which could, for vileness and indecency, be at all compared with that used by the women of Llangwm'. Perhaps the quotation says more about the 'good' Reverend than it does about our female ancestors?

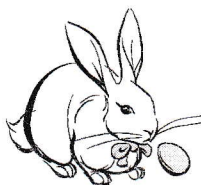
We are pleased to report that **at present** the situation with the post office is OK and there is no imminent threat of closure. Easter opening hours are:

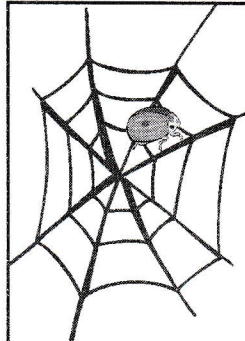

## MURCO charity row to Ireland

Last year, four members of Murco refinery completed the triathlon in Neyland to raise money for charity. They seemed to enjoy the rowing aspect and I thought it would be a good idea to raise money for local charities through a similar event and tentatively came up with the idea of rowing from **Milford Haven** Murco refinery to Conoco Phillips Whitegate Refinery in **Cork**. My initial idea obviously met with a good reception as the crews are now committed to regular training sessions!! The distance we plan to row is 110 miles and we endeavour to complete this within 30 hours with a rotation of three crews of four men.

When we approached Murco refinery (Milford Haven) with the idea, they were very enthusiastic about the challenge and offered to support the event by matching the amount we raise through sponsorship. To date, we have raised **£3,500** through local companies and are hoping to increase this to **£6,000**. We have been hard at work fundraising locally and are due to collect at Withybush Hospital and Morrison's, Haverfordwest in the next few weeks. The charities we are raising money for are : **Angle RNLI, Wales Air Ambulance, Paul Sartori, Bucketful of Hope and CLIC**.

The challenge will be taken on using a **Llangwm longboat** and we are most grateful for the support offered by **Llangwm Longboat Rowing Club** in helping towards organising the event and supplying us with the safety equipment, coaches and experienced coxes who have volunteered their services. A local dive company has also offered their services in supplying us with a safety boat during the challenge.

The event will take place on **1<sup>st</sup> May 2009** (weather permitting) but we do also have reserve dates set aside.

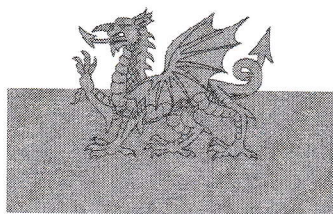
That was the best school trip ever.

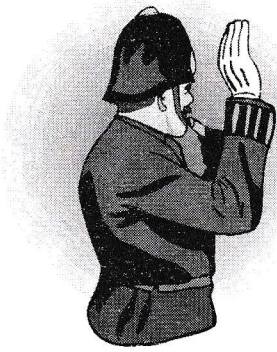
### **Snow in Llangwm school**

## Major Crime in Llangwm

Before the advent of the County Court system, major crimes were tried at the **Court of Great Sessions (Sesiwn Fawr)**

The following cases were recorded for Llangwm between 1745 and 1818:

On the 10th August **1745** a case of Assault (including wounding but not malicious wounding), came before the Court.

**David Griffith**, a yeoman, was accused of attacking **William Crunn**, a tailor in Llangwm. There is no other information recorded as to the outcome of this trial.

Some 15 years later, on the 19th of January 1760, **John David**, a miller of Llangwm, was accused of attacking **William Llewelin** at Burton. The case of Assault (including wounding but not malicious wounding) was proven, and John David was fined 6d.

On the 10th of June, 1770, **John Phillips**, a cooper, was accused of Murder (including aiding and abetting and accessory to murder). His victim was **William Stephens** of Llangwm, and a savage beating which led to William Stephens' death actually took place in Llangwm. A **Griffith Stephens** (presumably related to William) was the prosecutor representing the victim. No plea was given, and John Phillips was convicted of Manslaughter. No sentence was given in the documents, so what happened to him?

Forty eight years were to pass before another major crime was committed by a Llangwm villager, and on the 14th of March, **1801**, a **Mary Lawrence**, a married woman, was accused of Breaking and

Entering, mainly houses but also shops, workshops, mills etc. Her main accuser and prosecutor was Margaret Jones, a spinster of Lambston.

Mary Lawrence was caught after stealing wearing "apparel, cloth, wheat and a Japan canister" from Miss Jones' dwelling house. The prisoner, aged 50, made no plea., and she

was found guilty of Grand Larceny, a partial verdict, and sentenced to be transported to Australia for 7 years.

A more complicated trial took place on the 17th of June, 1812. John Menzies, alias Thomas Menzies, a Hawker, was charged with Miscellaneous Offences having taken place in Llangwm. He was accused by Mark Davies of Llangwm, a Customs Officer, of Bargaining for Money, viz guineas, and offering more than their current worth. The charge read "for preventing the current gold coin of the realm from being paid or accepted for a greater value than the current value of such coins for preventing any note or bill....of the Bank of England.... Being received for any smaller sum than the sum thereby specified". The indictment referred to Haverfordwest Bank notes. John Menzies offered a plea of Not Guilty, and this was the verdict of the Court.

Six years later two trials took place related to the Theft of a Sheep. **James Jones**, a labourer of Llangwm, and **Mary Thomas**, a single woman, were accused of stealing a sheep valued at £3 from **George Whittow**, a farmer in Llangwm. Mary was accused of sheep-stealing (including killing of the sheep with intent to steal carcass and aiding and abetting). The verdict given was "**no true bill**".

## Criminal Records

I have had a look for more information about the persons mentioned in Liz's article, but have not had a great deal of success.

Unfortunately, there were no local newspapers published in Pembrokeshire until 1844 when the '**Pembrokeshire Herald**' commenced publication. Before that date, there was the '**Welshman**' published in Carmarthen from 1829 onwards and the '**Cambrian**' in Swansea from 1804 onwards - neither of which newspapers are currently available in Pembrokeshire!

The gaol registers from the prison in Haverfordwest Castle survive only from 1813 onwards.

10 June 1770 case - **William Stephens** was buried at Llangwm parish church on 20 June 1770. [It seems odd that they kept a body above ground for at least 10 days in June.]

14 March 1801 case - Mary Lawrence, aged 50, sailed for New South Wales in November 1803 aboard the 'Experiment'. This case is mentioned in '**Welsh Convict Women**' by Deirdre Beddoe and in '**Women and Crime in 19th century Pembrokeshire**' by Audrey Philpin.

1818 case - the committal and discharge papers survive for **Mary Thomas** and **James James** [not Jones according to these papers]. **Mary Thomas** of Hook Wood, single woman, and **James James** of Llangwm, yeoman, were charged with stealing two yearling sheep on the night of Tuesday 17th March 1818. James was committed on 19th March and Mary on 21st March. They were both released from the prison on 27 March 1818. "**No true bill**" means that they were acquitted.

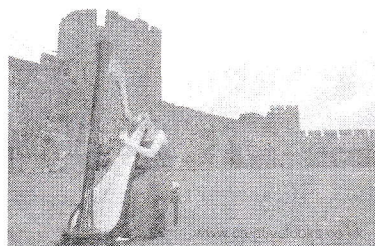

Joy Cornock is no ordinary cousin. As soon as she began to sing the audience sensed that this was no ordinary night's entertainment they had let themselves in for. A student at Cardiff's **Welsh School of Music**, Joy showed the full range of her fine soprano voice in folk song, operatic aria, hymn and the clever and humorous diva piece "I'm Tone Deaf" - by way of affirmation that Miss Cornock certainly was not.

The musicianship and talent of the two young ladies shone throughout. Carys's gentle compereship, sensitive harp-playing and accomplished piano skills were received with awe. Joy's rendering of Faure's "Pie Jesu" and Puccini's "O Mio Bambino Caro" set the occasion on an altogether loftier footing, and her mesmerising performance of "I Walked into the Garden" moving amongst the audience as she sang touched souls, and many a listener's tears flowed freely.



"Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah" gave the audience a chance to participate, followed by a rich and varied selection of songs and harp arrangements until the final encore "Cymru Bach" and its standing ovation brought with it the realisation that everyone present had been blessed in a special way.

## WINTER BIRD NOTES

The very cold spell of weather in January and early February had some marked effects on the bird population around the shore and in gardens, fields and hedgerows.

A number of people in the village reported greater number of finches particularly visits from **brambling** and **siskin** to their feeders. Other small birds more in evidence included **long tailed tits**, **coal tits** and **goldcrests**.

**Goldfinches** seem to be making a remarkable recovery and we appear to have a permanent flock in and around our garden often numbering more than 20 birds. Large numbers of **redwing** and **fieldfare** were much in evidence in the garden and surrounding countryside.

In early February Richard Joseph saw a single **waxwing** in the garden of 'Foxgloves' cottage in Rectory Road. These striking crested finch-like birds are winter visitors to eastern Britain but are occasionally seen in western parts often in small flocks. They are fruit-eating and like gardens and orchards.



The **RSPB Garden Birdwatch** took place on the weekend of 24/25 February and for once the birds did not desert our garden! I did my count in the hour before dusk when there is likely to be more activity with birds 'feeding up' to fortify themselves for the long cold night ahead. This year I recorded 15 different species including **coal tits** (2), **goldcrests** (2) and a **nuthatch** carrying a hazelnut in its bill.

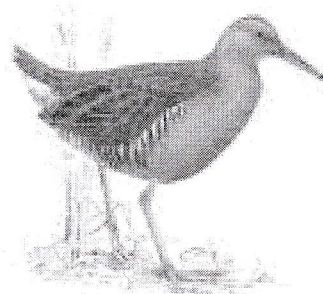
In the Pill and around the shores bird number are much the same as previous years with 60+ **teal**, 40+ **redshank**, a dozen or so **mallard** and sometimes as many as 36 **shelduck**.

A few **little grebe** (**dabchicks**) are regularly seen and there were 2 **great crested grebes** off Llangwm Ferry on 13 February. **Snipe** were regularly flushed from the vegetation around the shore at Llangwm Ferry and there were also large numbers in the fields around the village.

Notably, I have not seen a **little egret** for the best part of two months since that very cold spell of weather set in after Christmas. Possibly they have moved on temporarily to milder climes.

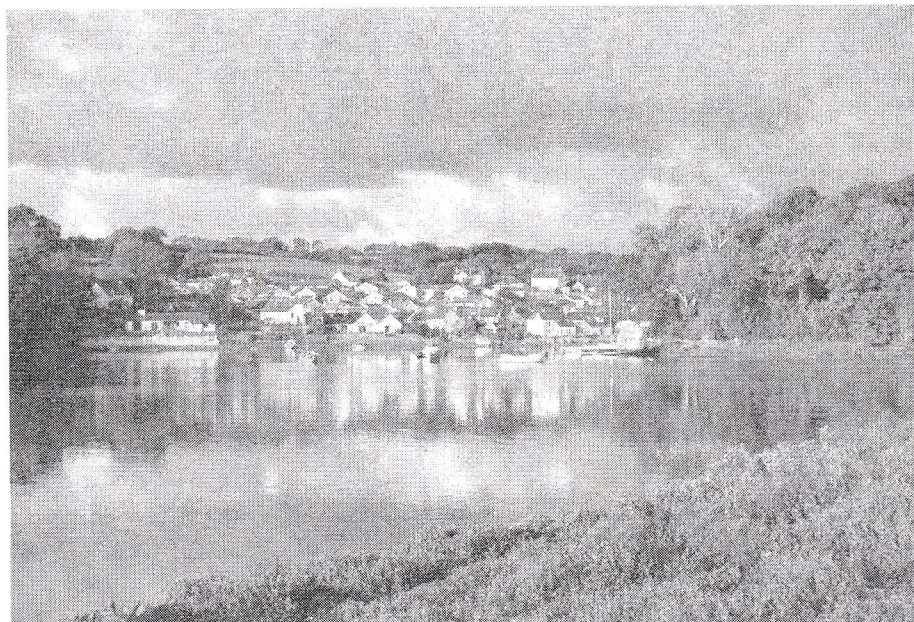
The **spotted redshank** is still with us although I don't recall seeing it at all in January. This is the fourth winter that it has spent with us and it will be moving on at the end of March/early April.

On 11<sup>th</sup> February I watched a **water rail** from a distance of eight feet picking its way around the irrigation pond at Newton Farm. These are very secretive birds and I was lucky to see it.
