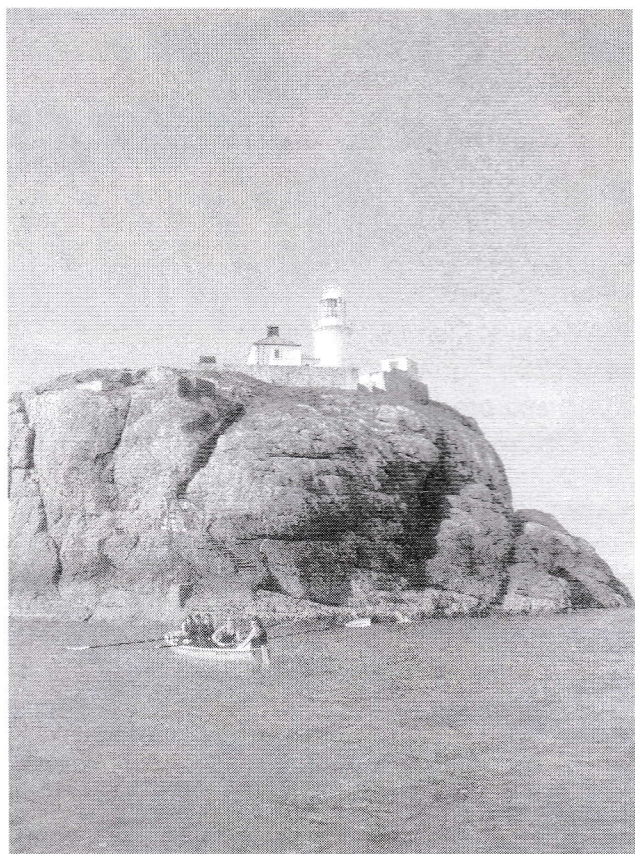

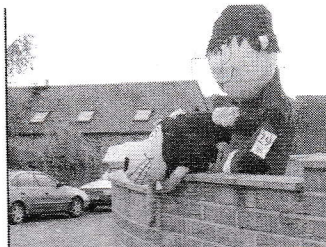
Something for Everyone at Llangwm's 10th Festival

The Festival Committee started working on this year's 10th anniversary Festival as soon as the 2008 festival finished. We were able to secure £1,550.00 in sponsorship from Chevron and Murco Oil Refineries and from Paul & Zoe at The Old Bakery on Main Street. A big thank you to them all, as these much needed funds allowed us to attach £400.00 of prize money for the Scarecrow competition and to fund an 18 x 9 metre marquee for the entire Festival fortnight.

The scarecrow competition was a great success seeing 85 entries, a four fold increase on previous years. Congratulations go to Sarah Hall, Mandy Davies and Graham & Joan Stephens, winners in the adult class and to Ebony Walker, Eithan & Kieran Prender and Llangwm School, winners in the child class.



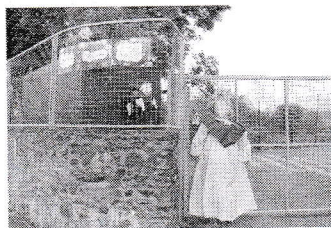

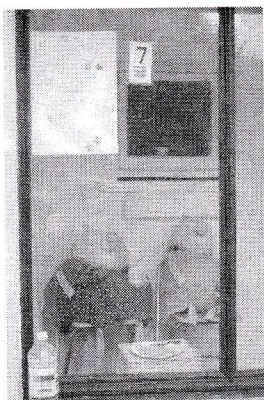
(Adult 2nd prize)

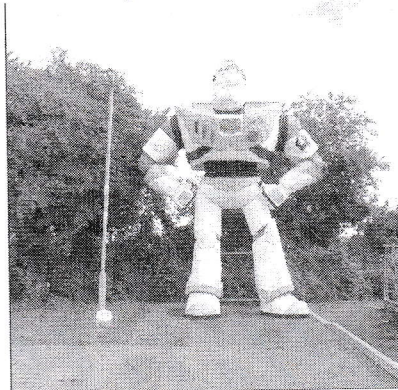

We were also delighted to see the return of the giant scarecrow, courtesy of the Mathias family. Bad weather delayed Buzz Light Year's arrival, but he did make it just in time.



In the Festival Marquee, we were able to offer entertainment for everyone with **Opera Playhouse** presented by St Jerome's Church and a **Comedy Night** with Phil Evans, Tudur Owen and Gillian Elisa, both events supported by the Arts Council For Wales. The Comedy Night proved to be a sell out performance.

The **One Voice Gospel** Choir from Cardiff appeared with the kind support of the Diocese of St. David's and delighted an audience of nearly 100.



In addition, the marquee hosted a **Race Night** courtesy of Junior Rugby, a **10th birthday Party** for Llangwm's Longboat Rowing Club and even a debate on the morals of Television courtesy of the **Wales Centre of the Royal Television Society**. A Big thank you must also go to the Rugby Club for providing a pay bar in the marquee throughout the festival.

The big social event of the fortnight was the mid summer dance with the Merlinaire's Big Band. All who attended this event thoroughly enjoyed their evening, but sadly a lack of support of this event proved to be the major contribution to the festival's financial losses.

As in 2008, the weather tried to dampen the carnival on Pill Parks Field. But step forward an 18 x 9 metre marquee and the village hall, which allowed us to put most of the carnival day under

cover. All in all, the Festival turned in an overall deficit of £870.91. The losses have been covered by reserves in the bank and you can see below the details.

The Festival Committee has decided only to run a few events in the 2009 / 10 year and these will be focussed on restoring the losses made this year. Nevertheless there will still be our traditional Father Christmas evening at The Village Hall on Friday 11th December and in view that Seafair will be taking place in July 2010, there will be no festival save for a carnival day on a date still to be confirmed. We are also still considering whether or not to have a scarecrow competition in 2010.

100 years young! Ellen celebrates a century of life in Llangwm

At her home at No. 1 The Green, Llangwm, where she is cared for by her son John, Ellen Skyrme reflects over her long life - she will celebrate her 100th birthday on 20th December 2009.

Here she shares some of her thoughts and memories with readers of Llangwm News.

Ellen was born with the maiden name Trevithick in St. Ives, Cornwall, her father George being a direct descendant of Richard Trevithick, inventor of the steam engine and a pioneer of the Industrial Revolution. Her mother, Mary Bryant of Llangwm, had been working in service at the Tre-genna Castle Hotel.

They moved to Llangwm when Ellen was three months old - and never looked back! They took rooms in a house in Rectory Road, with Ellen's grandmother, then living in Guildford. One of Ellen's earliest memories is the cast-iron bed, with its net curtains and a bow at the head of the bed - and a valance all around it.

In all that time, Ellen has seen changes in the village - "but Main Street is much as it was, apart from a few bigger houses. And changes have been so gradual, you don't really notice them."

"Years ago, you knew everyone. You never saw a door locked, in summer doors were always open. And everybody spoke to each other, you called them all by their Christian names - or by their nicknames (mind you, you get a lot of that now). My Granny was called Betsy Candles - their family was known as the Candles. There was another family called 'Whiskers' - there was Georgie Whiskers and Mary Whiskers."

The traffic however is much different today. "Now you can't move for cars."

Ellen remembers one of the first motor cars to come into the village, over Guildford Bridge heading up Main Street. "Someone in the street shouted Hey Ginny, look at that car coming all by itself! And it's going honk-honk!"

Ellen, her five sisters and her brother spent a happy, almost idyllic, childhood in the village, playing in the countryside and on the shore at Black Tar. They were a poor but very close family and life revolved around the school and the chapel.

School was happy but tough - "I still remember some of the songs we learned, about Spring, Summer, swallows and pigeons. I had the cane, but not very often! If you had the cane you couldn't use your hand for the rest of the day."

"I remember wearing tacky boots, lace-up boots with tacks in them. The boys wore hobnail boots."

The highlight of the year was the Sunday School Anniversary, for which children rehearsed for weeks. "About eight of us girls from Galilee used to go to Vinie Jones's house in Guildford to rehearse. Vinie was the chapel organist and a music teacher."

This was followed by a treat, the Sunday School outing to Tenby - at first by charabanc. "There were long benches with a door at one side, and a big canvas hood which was folded right back, the boys used to sit on it. If it was fine it was open, if it was raining they pulled the hood right over, and along each side there was a canvas curtain to keep you dry - if you were lucky!"

One of Ellen's startlingly vivid memories is that of helping to sell cockles.

"Mam would go out in the boat in the daytime with Aunt Clara. Aunt Clara sold pickled cockles, she cooked them the night before, and put them in jamjars with the pickle - that's how they sold them in Pater (Pembroke Dock). A one-pound jar of cockles would be about sixpennorth.

Sometimes Mam and I would go to Hook in the evening, selling cockles - in their shells then, not cooked. I don't suppose there's anyone else around who remembers this - we used to sell them 'by the long hundred'. A long hundred was 120, and to count them you took 3 cockles and counted them as one, counted 40, so that gave you your 120.

They only cost a couple of pence, threepence or sixpence maybe - don't forget there were 240 pence in the pound then.

Tragedy struck the family when Ellen's brother Billy died, aged 11, following an accident on his bicycle near the sea wall in Rectory Road, something Ellen will never forget and which saddens her to this day.

But she is philosophical about life, and offers this advice to young people:-

"You have your ups and downs, things happen to

you over the years. You just have to make life as happy as you can. You've got to accept it - you can make it happier for yourself or you can make it worse. It's up to you."

In her teenage years Ellen worked as a domestic help, in Swansea and Bournemouth, which she enjoyed.

"I worked in Haverfordwest too - for Roch James the butcher's family. I lived in the house where the shop is now, I had my own room. As a domestic, you weren't one of the family - you were a servant then, with them. It was hard work, it kept you going all day and night. Cleaning and cooking and all sorts. You'd have half a day off on Sunday, from 12 till 6 - and you'd also have a half-day in the week, Wednesdays I think it was."

Back in the village Ellen met the late Gwynne Skyrme, who lived at The Kilns, the youngest of 11 children and the brother of Lizzie Skyrme, who had taught Ellen at Llangwm School.

On 28th October, 1931, they married at Haverfordwest Registry Office and went on to have two sons, Bryant and John.

Ellen has three grandchildren, Ian, Julie, and Ceri, and seven great-grandchildren, Garon, Rhys, Louise, Menna, Rebecca, Nia, and Ieuan.

She is understandably proud of her family, and of her rich heritage of village life. She looks forward to celebrating her birthday in style - and enjoying every moment.

Llangwm Gardening Club News

Before the August break we held our annual AGM, in which we traditionally hold the competition for the **Joe Neal Cup**. Joe was one of the founder members of the Club, as many people know, and started the competition for the best plant in a 3" pot – he always said anyone can grow a good plant in a large pot, but it took a lot more skill and care to achieve this in quite a small pot. We have kept the competition going since his death a few years ago, and many club members enjoy the challenge.



This year the competition was won by **Caroline Box** (above) with a thriving sempervivens.

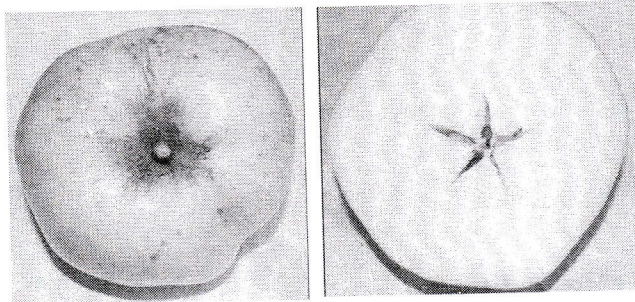
In September the **Chatsworth House and Gardens** meeting brought us all back to the Cottage for an illustrated talk by Judy Coggins, semi-retired housekeeper and guide from Chatsworth. Although now a Pembrokeshire resident, Judy still makes regular trips to Derbyshire to help at busy times. She gave us a hands-on account of the activities behind the scenes through a typical Chatsworth Year. The slides showed the gardens through the seasons and, apart from busy summers, visitors could enjoy the gardens in the autumn and winter – including tobogganing down the snowy slopes! Judy got snowed in herself last February, when the talk was first programmed, but it was worth the wait to September, when she made it safely to Llangwm!

We had a touch of Appley Dapple (apologies to Beatrix Potter!) in October with Steve and Leslie Jones of the **Tree Fruit Society of Wales**. The Society is involved with several local planting projects, including an orchard around the Pineapple House at Scolton Manor. Leslie explained that the aims of the Society included finding and preserving apple varieties that grew well locally, as many types of apple tree become stressed by our winds and salty air.

They also gave us an insight into the history of apple growing – grafting of apple stocks was recorded as far back as 5000 BC by Chinese horticulturists. There is still a tradition in China and Japan of giving an apple or pear as a gift – the bigger the fruit, the better the present!

(I saw some examples myself during a tour of the apple collection at Brogdale, Kent - there were some Japanese varieties with fruit as big as cantaloupe melons!)

Our guests put themselves on the spot by attempting to identify unknown apples that members had brought to the meeting. The identification systems they used did put a name to some, but others could not be positively identified. These were kept for further research and, hopefully, identification using shape, colour and seed case shape.



Steve and Leslie also asked that if anyone knew of an old apple tree, or even a small orchard, could we let them know. They can then check with the owners, visit the location, and put it on the map they are compiling. If a new variety turns up, you can even give it a name of your choosing – now that's a legacy to leave!

A fond farewell to all the friends we have made over the last 36 years in Llangwm and Hook.

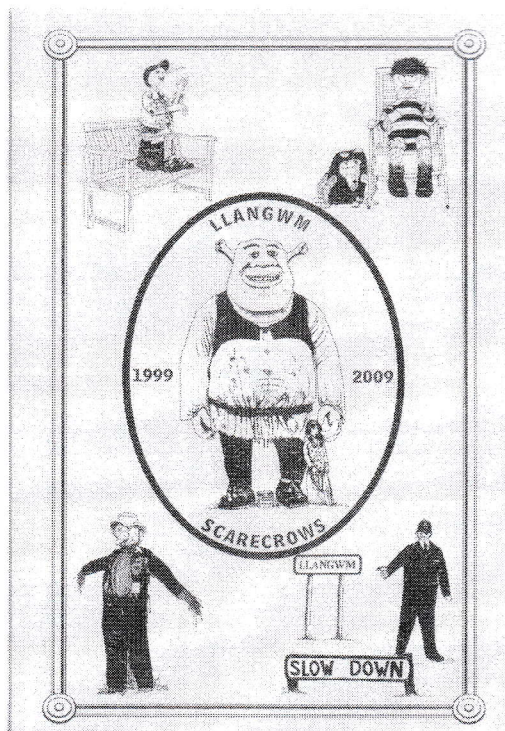

Firstly, many thanks to all of you who completed the questionnaire about the Village Hall that was enclosed in the last edition of the Llangwm News. The draw for the meal in the Cottage, offered to all those who returned their forms, was won by Kerry Ann Evans.

At the time of going to press the **Autumn Supper** has not yet taken place. The change of name was designed to emphasise that it was a social event for the whole village to enjoy, with a new format which included a 'Call my Bluff' type quiz, and then a supper of Chilli con Carne (mild, spicy or vegetarian) with baked potatoes and salad, followed by trifle. The report will be in the next edition!

The Hall is an ideal venue for private parties and celebrations as well as for use by clubs, etc for their meetings and activities. During the middle part of the Festival fortnight, the History Society held a very successful exhibition 'Llangwm - a Glimpse of the Past' in the Hall (report elsewhere) and at the end of the festival it was used as a venue for a variety of fête stalls and provided cream teas.

Church volunteers provided supper before the wonderful **Umdumo Wesize** concert, that took place in Llangwm Church in October, for the performers and their hosts. The Hall was also used to host tea for Bishop Wynne after a service to bless a beautiful wooden statue, carved by John Fuller, that has been presented to Llangwm Church by his widow Mary.

The **Church Christmas Bazaar** is in the Hall on **14th November**.

Sugarcraft takes place in the Hall every Tuesday evening and the **History Society** meetings are held there on Wednesday evenings once a month. **Junior Rugby** has continued to have its' teas in the Hall hosting both Home and Away teams.

Snippets from the archives of the 'West Wales Guardian' newspaper

"Brave Llangwm boy"

Dennis Lewis (15), son of Henry Lewis of Guildford, was presented with the vellum certificate of the Royal Humane Society for saving the life of Reggie Palmer (11), grandson of Thomas Palmer of Llangwm, who was in imminent danger of drowning on August 20th 1920.

Reggie Palmer was playing on a timber jetty at Llangwm Ferry when he accidentally fell into the water. There was a high tide running strongly at the time and he was carried out a distance of about 20 yards. Dennis Lewis was dressing after bathing, saw the incident and immediately dived off the jetty into about 12 feet of water. He swam to the rescue of Reggie Palmer and caught him as he was sinking for the third time.

"Terrible tragedy at Milford Haven"

The little shunting engine 'Skylark' at Ward's ship-breaking yard on Pill Point was returning from Newton Noyes manure factory at about 8.30 p.m. one February evening in 1923 and had to pass over a swing bridge spanning the narrow entrance from the main harbour to the Pill. The swing bridge had been opened to allow the passage of barge out to sea. In semi-darkness, the man responsible for the bridge frantically waved his lantern and shouted to the men on the engine, but the engine continued and there was a mighty splash as the engine, with its occupants, fell through the gap into the water below. The engine driver and a workman from the Fish Meal Factory swam to safety, but two other men on board the engine were not so lucky. The bodies of 50-year-old William Williams of Pill and 20-year-old William Glanmor George of Guildford were recovered the following day.

"Black-out complaints"

In August 1942, some people in the village were still ignoring the black-out regulations. One Saturday evening when it was quite dark, a house in Coronation Avenue had only pale yellow blinds shielding the light in the room, which afforded no black-out whatever.

"Llangwm to have policeman again"

"Llangwm was to be added to the list of places where a police house should be erected. This was decided by the Joint Standing Committee in January 1950 following a report on the unsatisfactory state of the police house at Houghton. It was pointed out that for many years a police officer had been stationed at Llangwm.

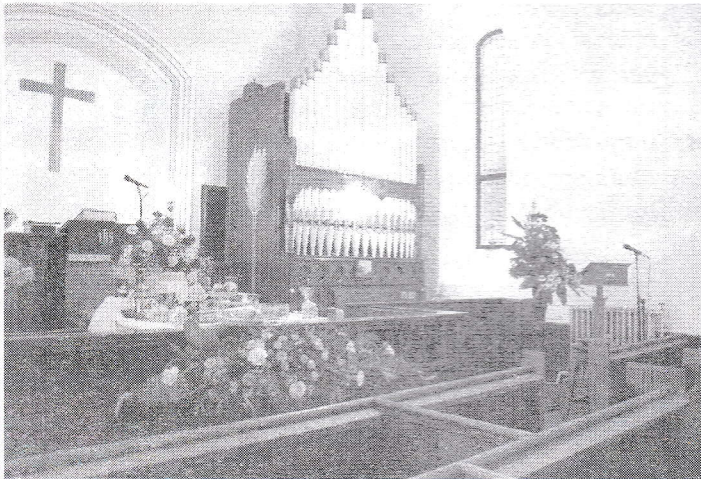

All the world's a stage - in Llangwm

Llangwm had a rare treat on the evening of Saturday 10 October 2009 when a young men's choir of international repute performed in the first of the autumn series of concerts in St Jerome's Church.

Umdumo Wesizwe comprises eight men from Zimbabwe who use the rich, traditional harmonies of Africa to perform songs of love, hope, worship, courtship, hardship and African social commentary.

The singers, who have been together since their schooldays, travel annually to appear at many major festivals and venues in the UK and Europe as well as their native Africa. Their congenial happy nature and charisma have won over audiences at the Llangollen International Eisteddfod, Edinburgh Festival, Glastonbury, WOMAD (Swindon's world music festival) - and now Llangwm Church.

They tour annually for six months, rehearse for four, and have two months holiday - most have young families at home in Bulawayo, to whom they will return in November.

Described in the *Scottish Herald* as having "enough charisma and energy to light up a continent... with their gloriously unfettered singing" the choir sang with verve and passion. Refusing to be hampered by the limited space of St. Jerome's, each young man took a turn to perform a high-energy dance manoeuvre such as 'foot-clapping' (don't try this at home!) and enviably supple body movements in rapid sequence to the music. High leaps were a firm favourite, and expressive hand and arm movements punctuated the spellbinding performance.

But it was the magic mix of their voices that made *Umdumo Wesizwe* live up to their name as "Sound of the Nation". Their leader and songwriter Mqoqi Nkomo has taken African harmony to new spheres while keeping its essential captivating sound. A master of audience rapport he relies on good sports (on this occasion Melanie Hughes) to join in, play a part and add to the fun.



This was, all in all, another wonderful event arranged by the unstoppable Pam Hunt, who has contributed greatly to broadening the entertainment horizons of the village over the past few years. Well done to Pam, to Rev. Jane for her foresight, to the Wales Night Out scheme for financial support, to the ladies of St Jerome's who put on a welcome chilli supper for the choristers, and to the host families who provided accommodation, making it possible for *Umdumo Wesizwe* in turn to sample the unique welcome that Llangwm had to offer them.

The Welsh Water Experience

On the 21st of October Year 6 of Llangwm School went to Llys y Fran Reservoir for a Welsh Water Experience. 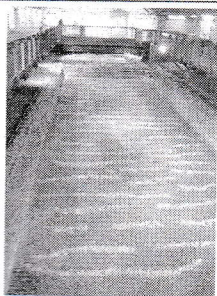
Crucial Crew

This exhibition was only possible as a result of the fantastic response to several scanning sessions held in the Village Hall and with the help of the Pembrokeshire Museums Service. Numerous people brought old photographs of family and areas of the village which were transferred onto computer and are now part of a most valuable village archive. Many other people spent time identifying people and places in the photographs and providing information about them. The result was a highly professional exhibition which was enjoyed by well over 400 people.

Opened by Councillor Michael John at a special preview, the exhibition was open for several days over the Festival. Children from Llangwm School paid a visit and had great fun completing worksheets prepared by Graham Stephens. There were also numerous occasions when visitors were able to provide additional information and several times when visitors found out information concerning their own family history. A special, sell-out success was the lunchtime talk given by **Rob Scourfield** on Llangwm and local Pembrokeshire dialects. Rob kept everyone in stitches with his stories about local words, characters and events – many of which were well-known to Llangwm people - and has promised to make a return visit for a further talk.



Thanks must be given to all those who made the exhibition such a success – those who provided pictures for copying, identified individuals in photos, those who acted as stewards, Charlotte New & Mark Thomas from the Museums Service and everyone who contributed to make the exhibition something that Llangwm can be proud of.



Plans for the future include further scanning sessions to continue to develop the village archive. There will be one towards the end of November, so please keep an eye out for details. The Local History Society is also delighted that it has been able to assist several individuals with strong Llangwm connections in researching their family history. Most have made contact through the village website and we are delighted that our archive is proving to be so useful and valuable resource.

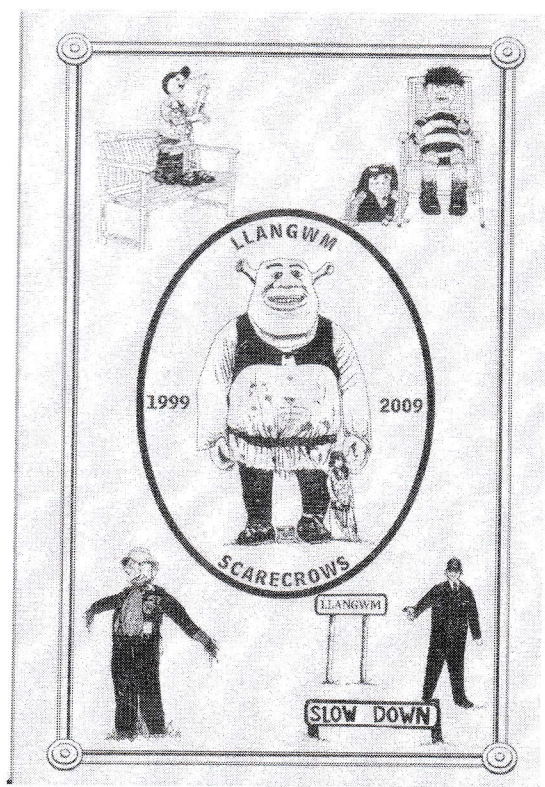
Thanks to them, and all the other occasional helpers. And not forgetting the various team Scorers who have our sincere thanks as well.

An appeal from **PPGRG**

Llangwm residents will be aware of the very poor condition of the grandstand and changing rooms on Pill Parks. Heavy and increasing usage over the past 40 years has taken its toll to the point where the building is not fit for purpose. During the rugby season the changing rooms are used on an almost daily basis with training and playing for seniors, youth and juniors and similar in the cricket season with many teams from senior to junior including women.

The Pill Parks Grandstand Redevelopment

Group (PPGRG) was set up to address this situation and initially were optimistic that a variety of grants for community sport would go a long way to bring the facilities up to a standard that would benefit all our village sporting interests for many years to come, including a gymnasium that the rowing club and other groups could use. Unfortunately, the economic downturn and other factors have resulted in the rugby and cricket clubs settling for a much reduced scheme of work which includes repairing the roof, replacing windows, fitting new and improved boiler and showers and replastering the inside. The building will be completely repainted and repaired on the outside so that it becomes less of a 'blot on the landscape'. This scheme will cost in the region of **£75,000** and the club has secured a loan from the **Welsh Rugby Union** of **£30,000** which coupled with other fund raising activities puts the current budget at close to **£40,000**. It is hoped that the remaining sum will come from members, sponsors and via fund raising events involving the whole community to celebrate the **125th anniversary of Llangwm Rugby Club** in season 2010/2011. In addition, many local tradesmen and suppliers are offering their generous support.

We would very much appreciate any financial help from anyone who feels they can support us towards our goal of providing improved sporting facilities at Pill Parks for the whole Llangwm community. We would also appreciate any other offers of support such as helping with future events, lending a hand with the refurbishment etc.
