# Llangwm Local History Society

The autumn and early part of this year has seen a further range of fascinating talks on different aspects of local history. The **History of Local Public Houses** by Keith Johnson (local author and editor of Pembrokeshire Life magazine) proved particularly popular, as Keith regaled us with stories of local hostelryes. He was also given information about the location and ownership of several public houses in Llangwm by those present.

**Mark Muller's talk on the Haverfordwest Workhouse was excellent, as he painted a picture of the rapidly changing face of society leading up to the legislation which established workhouses. His tale of one poor boy and his fate was most moving.**

In February, we were fortunate to have a talk on **Coal, Ore and Metals**: the coastal mining landscape of Pembrokeshire by Dr Peter Claughton, who is an Honorary Fellow at the University of Exeter. He gave a wide view of mining in Pembrokeshire and its connections with Devon and added considerably to the knowledge many people have of the workings at Hook colliery.

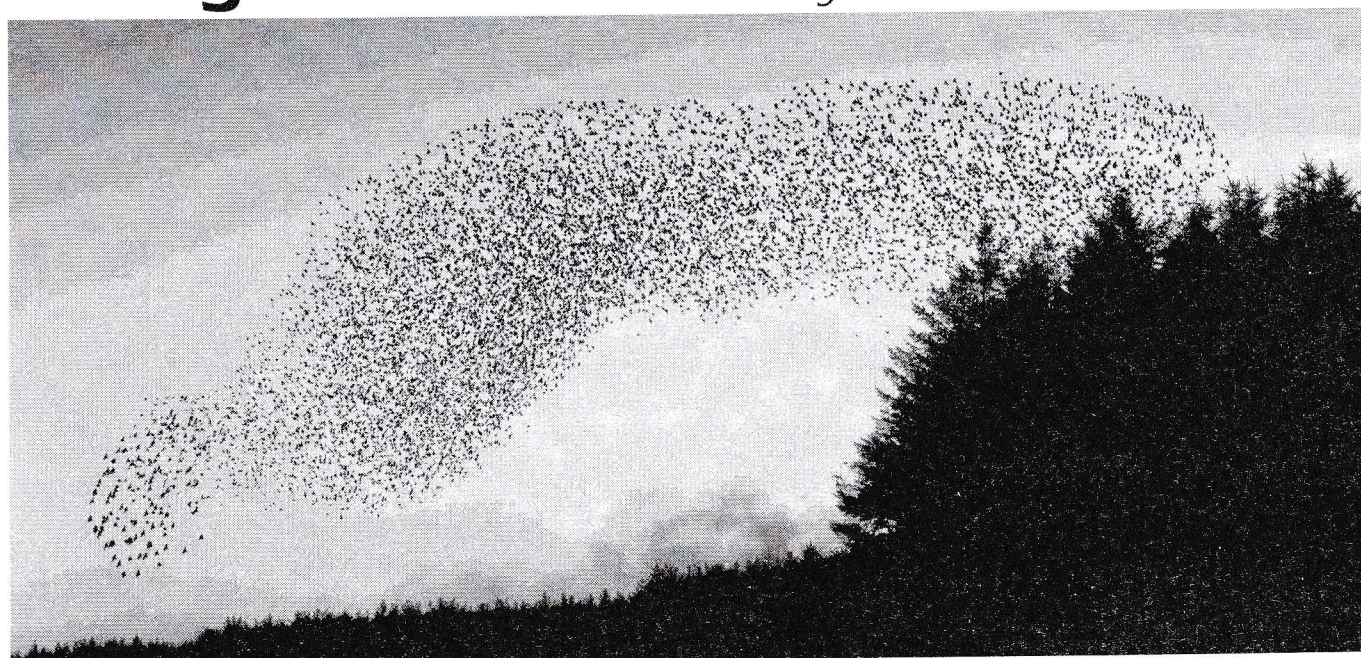

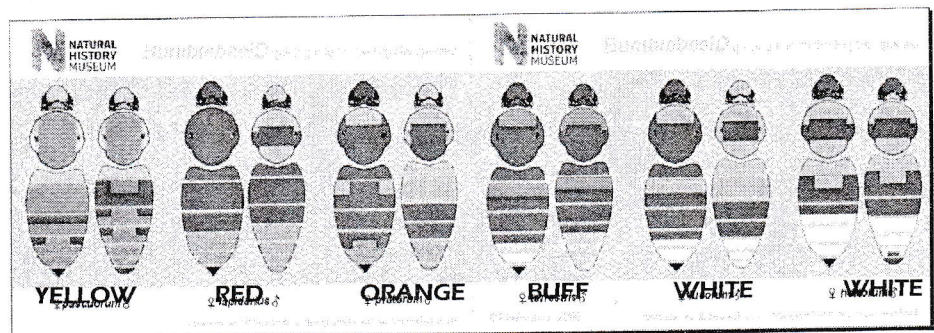
**Busy Bees** was the topic of our first talk at the Club in the February meeting by local beekeeper **John Dudman**. He started with a comparison of bumble and honey bees, and I didn't realise there were so many different bumble bees – I shall look with new interest at their tail colours in the summer! The Bumblebee Conservation Trust has a website : [www.bumblebeeconservationtrust.co.uk](http://www.bumblebeeconservationtrust.co.uk) for more info. We had a colour handout to identify the different bumblebees, but we can only do black and white here! I've put a "bottom colour ID" underneath to help.

John gave a very informative talk explaining the complex social structure in the hive which results in the honey produce we love. Honey bees have been suffering quite badly recently with poor summers – lack of food plants – and disease, which has been devastating hives. Although retired, John lectures on bee-keeper training courses around the country, and his philosophy is to work in harmony with nature and the environment, not to be greedy when it comes to harvesting honey, and encouraging planting of food plants close at hand to hives. Apparently, modern cultivars of garden plants are often either sterile (no pollen) or have inaccessible nectaries for bees, so it's important to have a corner that you can plant with some of the older varieties just to supply the honey bees with pollen and nectar eg bugle, buddleia, rosemary, chives, cornflowers and lots more.

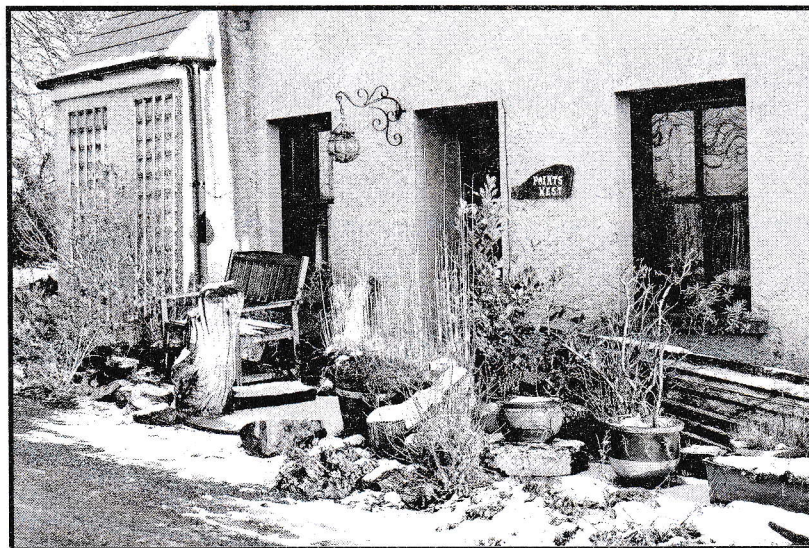


The other good news, since John mentioned it in his talk, is that Pembrokeshire has been awarded a substantial grant for the study and habitat preservation of the tiny rare Shrill Carder bee found only in the Castlemartin MOD area. There was an online vote for various projects to get the funding, so **thank you** to all who voted for this local important one.

During the same meeting we held our annual **Photographic Competition**, which had been postponed from its original date in January. The subject was "**A Pembrokeshire Garden**" – but not your own! – and was won by a photo of the tiniest garden, entitled "**A Minimal Garden**" (see photo) and taken by Maureen John.

A working party from the Gardening Club has also been as busy as bees at the **Llangwm School garden** - now the problem trees have been sorted out, Mike Wargeant has been organising some clearing, pruning and planting in the garden. The children should be able to enjoy the facility even more now, especially with the weather improving. Thanks to all who helped out.

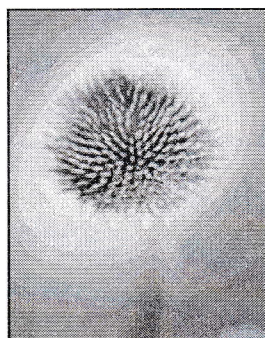

## Music at St Jerome's

After the sell out performance by Undumo Wezitswe last October, the autumn concert season was rather disrupted. In November our traditional Remembrance Concert had to be abandoned at the very last minute because of heavy rain preventing the Milford Band and most of the audience even reaching the church. Nevertheless, the concert was remounted on January 27<sup>th</sup> with an excellent performance by the band.

The first half consisted of suitable music interspersed with readings of war poetry. RAF veteran Michael Wargent, current serving soldier Dean Wilson and Hollie Bosenius read a range of war poems written between 1914 and 2009. The First half ended with the traditional Evening Hymn and Last Post with an evocative solo played by Liz Llewellyn. The second half provided more upbeat music with a Beatles Medley and a traditional New Orleans rendering of "Just A Closer Walk". The concert ended with the famous British Legion March.

Our Christmas Concert had to be changed at short notice when the reading of A Christmas Carol had to be called off. But step forwards The Penfro Minstrels, an eleven-piece string and woodwind orchestra who saved the day and put on an entertaining programme of Christmas music for us.

But those lovers of Charles Dickens need not despair as thanks to Night Out, Dickens's own abridged reading of A Christmas Carol will take place on Saturday December 11<sup>th</sup> 2010 at St Jerome's. Performed by Pip Utton, one of Europe's leading solo performers and who looks remarkably like Dickens himself.

It has been decided, however, to reduce the number of concerts. This is because there has been a tail off of audiences over the last 18 months, so we are going to bring to Llangwm fewer, but much higher profile performances after the summer.

Watch out for the publicity.



## The Story of St. Jerome's Church

### AN EASTER EXHIBITION

We walk or drive past it most days and probably don't give it a second thought, but Llangwm's oldest building has a long and fascinating history. St Jerome's was built in the 13th century by **Gilbert De la Roche**, head of the Benton Castle branch of the De la Roche family, whose ancestor had fought alongside William the Conqueror and who had been granted lands in Pembrokeshire in the 1240s. They chose a site in Llangwm that had already been a place of Christian worship since the 8th century, and there our little medieval church has stood for nearly **800 years**, serving the community. It has seen the village through the **Black Death**, the **Reformation** and the **Civil War**. St

Jerome's stood there providing a sense of permanency to the peoples who have come and gone over the centuries.

Unusually for a small village church, the effigies of two members of the De la Roche family lie in the North aisle, suggesting that those members of the family will be buried in a crypt, yet there is no evidence of where that crypt might be. The church also has a covered **piscina**, something that reminds one of the church's pre-reformation days. A piscina is unusual enough, as most were ripped out in the 16th & 17th centuries, but this is believed to be the only covered one in Pembrokeshire. Another point of interest are the

stones jutting out above the pulpit. These are believed to be all that remains of the staircase up into what would have been a minstrels' gallery prior to its major renovation in the 1870s.

If you want to find out more, then come along to an exhibition telling the story of the church over the centuries. Discover the window where local Lepers could take communion, learn about the De La Roche family and their influence on the local community.

**Come along and marvel at the story of the earlier years of our village.** The Exhibition will be open from **Easter Monday 5th April until Saturday 10th April, from 12 - 4.00pm.**

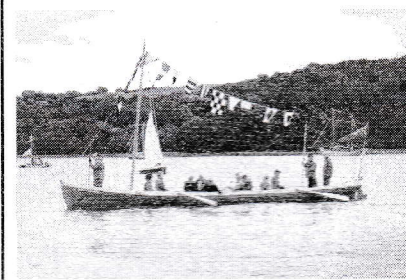
## SEAFAIR HAVEN

We have had little influence over the Milford Haven Port Authority's arrangements for the Festival, even though we hosted half the boats and crew numbers last time, and we had been asked to take on more than we could reasonably deliver for a third of the financial grant provided last time.

But such was the Llangwm community's previous welcome, we can expect many of the Seafair crews to call on us in early July.



## Books You Might Like

Barry Childs

**Elmore Leonard** is one of the greatest American writers of crime fiction. In that genre 'Maximum Bob' is one of his best. His books will entertain you from first page to last and will put a smile on your face. In his early days he wrote Westerns, some of which were made into films. My favourite is 'Hombre', a western that is much more than that. The film version starred Paul Newman and Frederic March.

**Nick Hornby** is among the best of current British writers. He has written one of the most acclaimed books there is on football ('Fever Pitch') and has also written six novels, the most recent being 'Juliet, Naked'. The title is more than a bit misleading but it's worth finding out why he chose it. Incidentally, Nick Hornby wrote the screen play for 'An Education' a recently released film which has been nominated as best film for this year's Oscars.

'Wild Swans' was written a little time ago. Its author is **Jung Chang** and this, her autobiography, tells of three generations of women in her family: her grandmother, her mother and herself. Life in China under Mao Zedong is vividly recalled - the hardship, brutality, particularly at the time of the Cultural Revolution. I've just read the book again, following a visit to China last Summer. It's a long but worthwhile read.



# Remember this...

## 50 years ago in Llangwm



"Electricity was cut off for several hours at Llangwm yesterday when a helicopter from Brawdy tore through high tension cables spanning Llangwm Pill. The pilot, Lieut. Rodney Griffiths, landed the aircraft on the Pill Parks, Llangwm's rugby-recreation ground."

This was reported in the 'West Wales Guardian' on 13<sup>th</sup> May 1960. In the helicopter with Lieutenant Griffiths were Leading Airman William Rogers and a passenger, Naval Air Mechanic Brian Pinnington.

"Residents rushed to the ground to render what service they could but fortunately the pilot and his crew landed without injury. Eye-witnesses say there was a bright flash as the machine severed the cables."

"Schoolchildren on their way home had an unexpected diversion, especially when a second helicopter, bringing Naval engineers to inspect the damage plane landed on the Pill Parks."

"An examination revealed that the 'chopper' was not badly damaged and soon the 'show' was over, both craft taking off together shortly after 5 p.m. In the interval, although the power supply had been cut off, the airmen were entertained to tea!"

A few weeks later, the 'West Wales Guardian' informed its readers that "Fourteen days before he terminates his service in the Royal Navy, a 26-year-old pilot, Rodney Stephen Griffiths, of Long Levens, Gloucester, was sentenced at a court martial at the R.N. Air Station, Brawdy, to forfeit one year's seniority and to be severely reprimanded."

Lieutenant Griffiths had pleaded guilty to flying a Dragonfly helicopter at a height of less than 100 feet.

# Llangwm VC Primary School

**Welcome to the Llangwm V.C School section of the newsletter. The items below provide information about some of the events and activities that have taken place recently.**

**S**ince June 2009 the governing bodies of Burton and Llangwm VC Schools have held many meetings concerning the future provision of education within the two areas.

The Governing Bodies of Burton and Llangwm VC Schools have now jointly agreed, with the full support and agreement of Pembrokeshire County Council and the St David's Diocesan Education Authority to effect the merger of the schools. It is intended that the merged school will operate on the two existing sites from September 2010.

It is also intended at some time in the future to build a new school within Llangwm to accommodate the merged school on a single site. It is hoped that funding for the new school building will be granted soon and that the new school will be completed by the middle part of this decade.

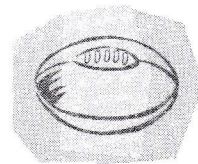
### Tesco Vouchers for Schools

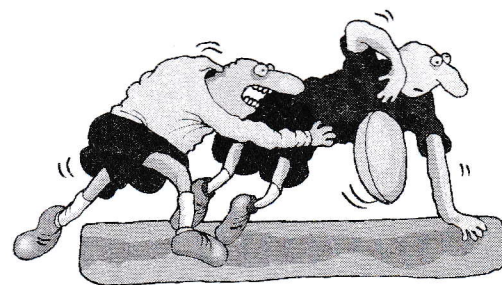

The Under15's will be taking part in the **District Cup** with an away draw to Narberth on the 28/03/10.

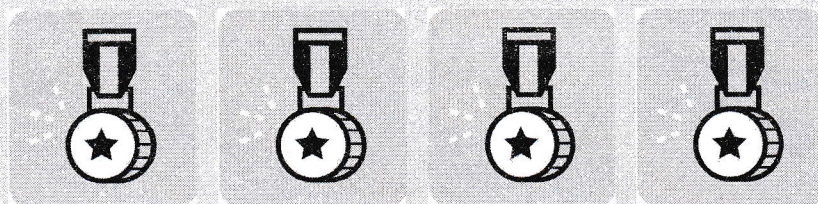
Under 8's will be in action on Good Friday Tournament at Crymych. (02/04/10)
