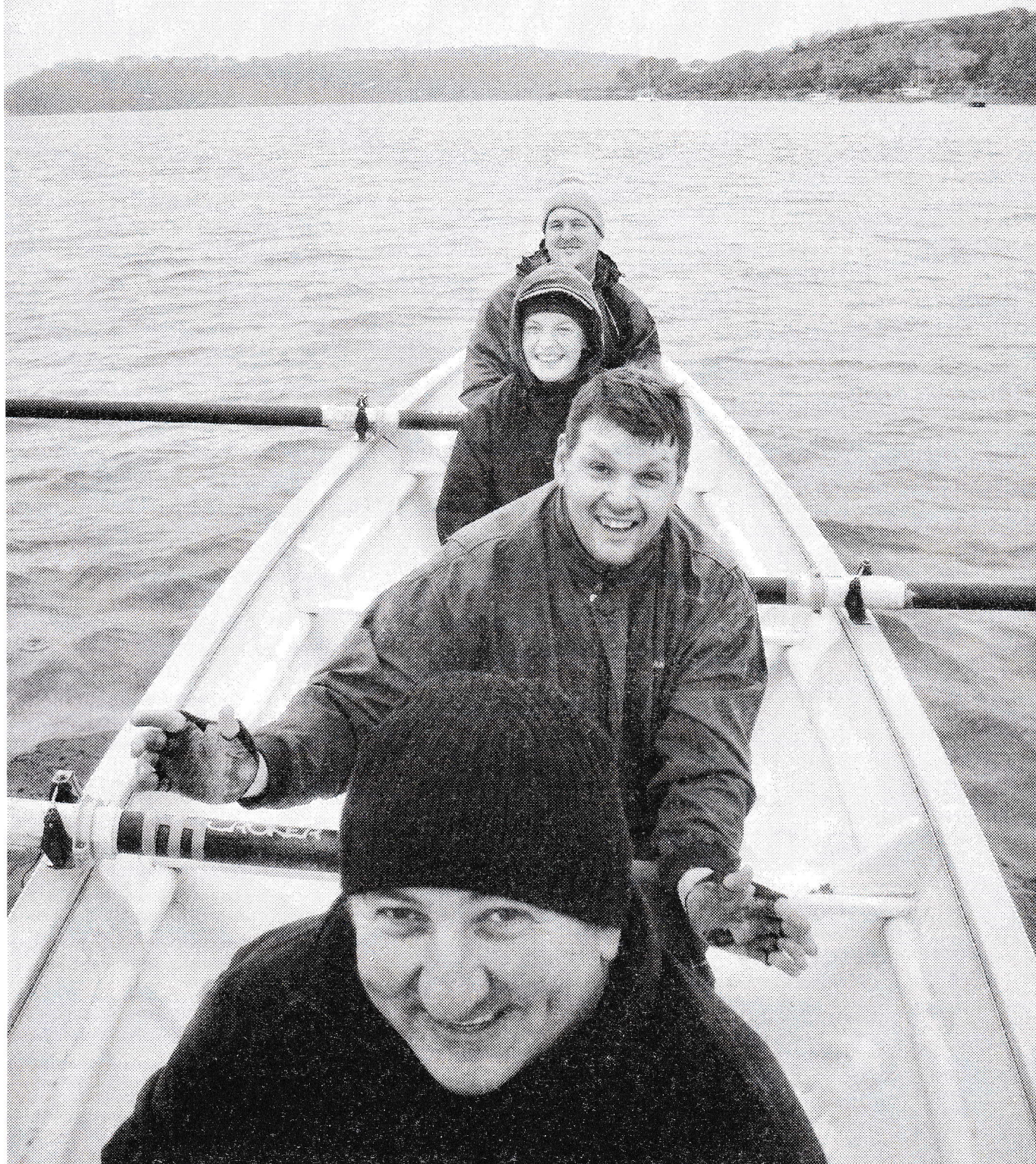

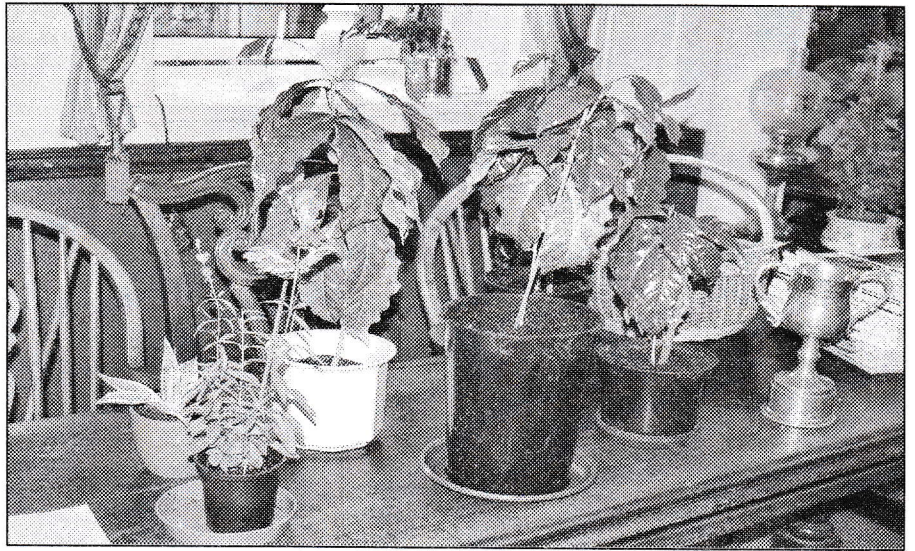


# Gardening Club News

The Sun, with all those plants revolving around it and dependant on it, can still ripen a bunch of grapes as if it had nothing else in the Universe to do - Galileo

At the time of writing we are enjoying an Indian summer, and grapes are ripening very well! We learned the seasons when young as Spring, Summer, Autumn, Winter, but it seems as though they have jumbled themselves up a bit this year into Winter, (miss out Spring!), Summer, Autumn, then Summer again! But the plants always seem to be able to sort themselves out in the end. It seems that the honeybee population may be recovering as well, according to a report in the RHS Journal (The Garden Aug 2010 "News" pg 518) –we had an insight into bee life in a club talk last year. Despite the harshest winter for 30 years about 80% of overwintering colonies have survived, compared with 70% previously.

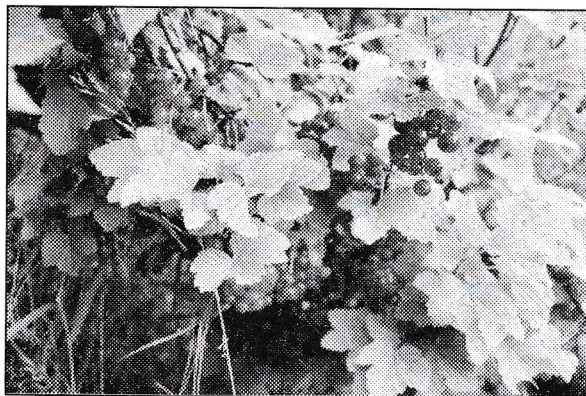

chill – and keep your feet warm! – by stimulating the circulation? Lara is fully qualified as a Herbal Practitioner, and the Healthcare Centre has a website which can be found at : [www.naturalhealthcarenewport.co.uk](http://www.naturalhealthcarenewport.co.uk) It was a fascinating evening enjoyed by everyone, and we are hoping to follow it up next summer with an actual foray with Lara around the village hedgerows.

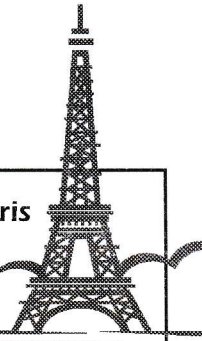

As part of its St. David's Day celebrations next Year, there will be a St. David's Day Supper followed by a performance of Dylan Thomas's "Reminiscences of Childhood" by Tour de Force and presented in association with Night Out. Villagers will remember the Tour de Force team who put on Noel Coward's "Brief Encounters", directed and featuring Adrian Metcalfe during the summer.

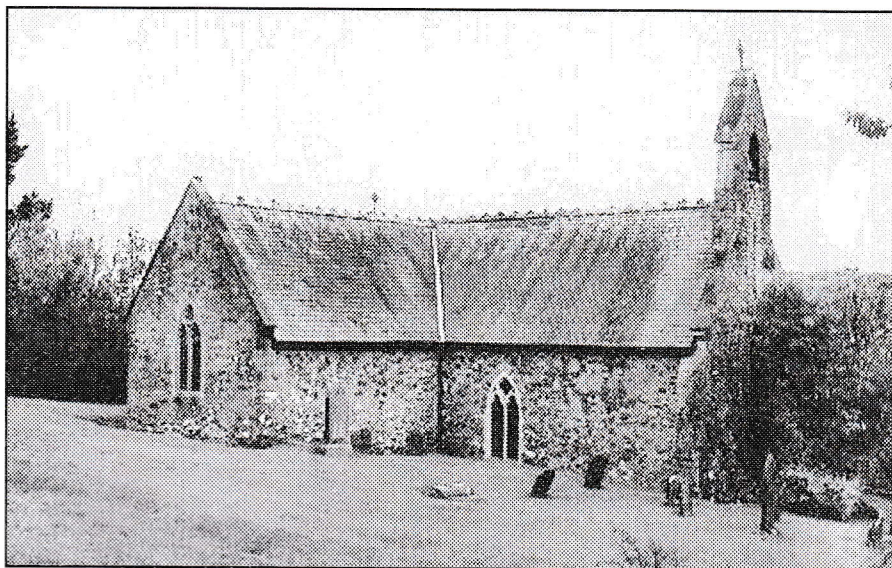
Now, following its award-winning debut at the Edinburgh Festival in 2008, Adrian has performed this one-man show all over the world to considerable critical acclaim. It was developed from the short stories and poetry of Dylan Thomas and focuses on a dying man's attempts to justify his existence. During this journey through his memories, he begins to learn about the transience of life and the joy of innocence, the loss of love and the sadness of regret. It is at once beautiful and ugly, engaging and hilarious.

Metcalfe draws on a wide range of works by the author including The Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man, Quite Early One Morning, The Collected Poems and Return Journey. These are all seamlessly entwined with Metcalfe's own prose creating this poignant and touching portrayal.

This special evening will take place on Friday 18<sup>th</sup> February and tickets including the light supper will be £10.00 per person. This is a 'not to be missed evening', so mark this date in your diary.



# Llangwm Local History Society



**Earlier in the year, a collaborative project between the Local History Society and St Jeromes Church saw a successful exhibition held in the church between 5th & 10th April.**

St Jerome's was built by the De La Roche family in the 13th Century, who, having fought alongside William of Normandy, had been granted lands in South Pembrokeshire. At first, they had built a castle at Roch but found it too windy, damp and cold, so they built another castle at Benton and also the church in Llangwm. The site chosen had been a place of Christian worship since the 8th century.

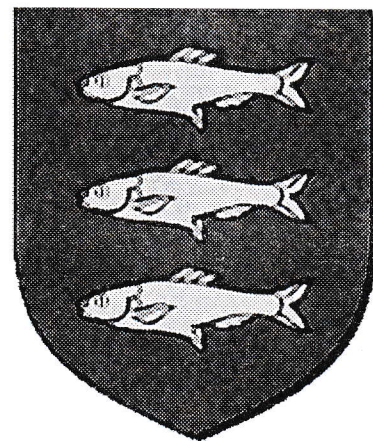
This medieval church has stood for nearly 800 years serving the community. It has seen the village through the Black Death, the Reformation and the Civil War. St Jerome's represented a sense of permanency to the people who have lived and died here over the centuries.

Unusually for a small village church, the effigies of two members of the De La Roche

family lie in the North aisle, suggesting that those members of the family will be buried in a



crypt. As yet there is no evidence of where that crypt may be. The church also has a covered piscine, something that reminds of the church's pre-Reformation days before most were removed during the turbulent years of the Reformation. It is believed to be the only covered one in Pembrokeshire. The stones jutting out above the pulpit are

also of interest as they indicate a spiral staircase leading to the rood-loft. This would have housed a minstrels' gallery prior to the renovation of the 1870's.

The exhibition gave information about the De La Roche family history, key background events over the life of the church, biographies of key individuals and displayed an artist's impression of how St Jerome's would have looked shortly after it was built. Many thanks to Ed Tanguay for this.

Work is ongoing on research of Llangwm's early history as well as an oral history project to record people's memory of the village. If you would like to be involved in any way, please contact a member of the committee.

### **Report for Autumn and Christmas 2010**

Over the past year at Galilee prayers have been offered and donations have been sent in respect of world disasters such as the Haiti earthquake and the Pakistan floods.

Back in summer, at the Sunday School Anniversary service on 20th June, a fine performance of solos, choruses and recitations was given by the children and invited guests.

Harvest Festival was celebrated in morning and evening services on Sunday 26th September, when friends and worshippers from other local chapels joined with the congregation for a time of thanksgiving. 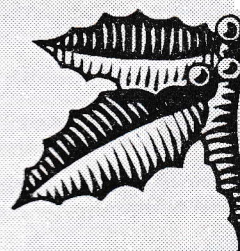

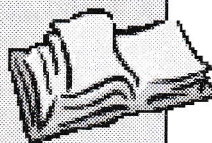

## A Few More Good Books

If you like to read about places, some of which you may have visited, some others you probably won't have then Stuart Maconie's **'Adventures On the High Teas'** is one to certainly look out for. It is interesting, wittily written and will make you think. It takes you around the middle of England to places like The Cotswolds, The Chilterns, Lincolnshire etc. It doesn't matter where he takes you he always has something interesting to say about that place and, very often, will leave you thinking 'I wouldn't mind going there.'



Not perhaps, in some respects, to everybody's taste because of their hard hitting nature is the trilogy of crime stories written by the Swedish writer Stieg Larsson: **'The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo'**, **'The Girl who played with Fire'** and **'The Girl who kicked the Hornets' Nest'**. The main character and the story lines are far from conventional. All three books are quite long but it doesn't feel that way when you read them. An interesting but sad footnote is that the author, having delivered the books to the publisher, did not live to enjoy their enormous world-wide success, dying suddenly at the age of 50. His books are now being made into films.

If you do decide to read some or all of the above then I hope you get as much enjoyment out of them as I did.

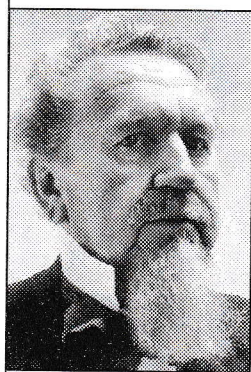

The increased rapidity with which the letter carrier would complete his rounds if the plan of house-door letter-boxes was universally adopted is plainly obvious. The Postmaster General closes his appeal for the more general adoption of the plan, as follows: - 'It is hoped that those householders, who have not hitherto provided letter-boxes, will not object to do so; and by that means, at a very moderate expense, they can promote the convenience both of themselves and of their neighbours, and at the same time, render an important aid to the public service.'

On Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> December at 7.30pm and in association with Night Out, we are proud to present "A Christmas Carol" read by Charles Dickens... Well not Dickens himself, but Pip Udett playing the role.

In December 1853 Charles Dickens gave his first public reading of A Christmas Carol. It lasted over three hours! Eventually abridged to about 1 1/2hrs it was the main item in his final Farewell performance in 1870. In this candlelit performance, and looking uncannily like Dickens himself Pip, one of Europe's leading solo performers with an international reputation, now recreates Dickens' readings of A Christmas Carol using the script containing the cuts and directions Dickens himself

made. Pip reads as the author of the ghostly Christmas tale, in which Ebenezer Scrooge is advised to change his ways by the Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present and Future.

It is a very atmospheric show and well worth putting the date in your diary. In a recent review, The Guardian described him, "the master of the one-man show" young pretenders should take time to see his show to learn how it should be done.' Tickets will go on sale on November 12<sup>th</sup> and are £7.50 for adults and £3.50 for children. Mulled wine and mince pies will be available in return of a donation and why not get into the character of this famous Christmas event by coming in Victorian costume.



# LLANGWM CRICKET CLUB

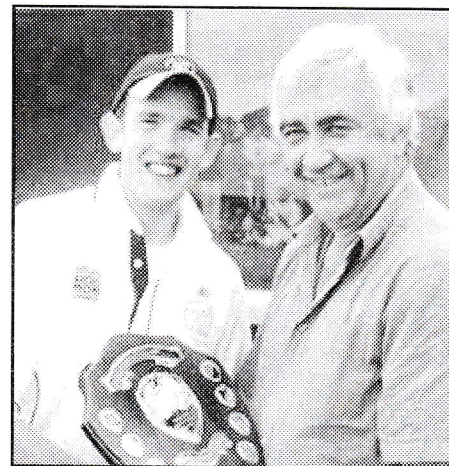

# Cleddau Reach VC

## Primary School News

**Welcome to the Cleddau Reach V.C School section of the newsletter. The items below provide information about some of the events and activities that have taken place recently.**

Cleddau Reach V.C was established in September 2010 when Llangwm V.C. Primary and Burton V.C. Primary were amalgamated. At present the new school is operating on the sites of the two previous schools.

An enlarged Governing Body for the new school has been established and my responsibilities as Headteacher extend across both sites of the new school.

During the previous school year the governors and staff from both schools met regularly to ensure that the transition to the amalgamated school could be made as smooth as possible.

Our aim behind that work was to ensure that the initial amalgamation brought positive changes but also a sense of continuity for the staff and children on both bases. This term the staff on both Bases of the new school have worked very hard to ensure that the many positive features of the two schools have been combined to develop a new school which will provide an outstanding education for the children from both areas.

From September the children on both bases have had the opportunity to attend a range of school clubs that have operated on both sites. The children have also been combined to represent the new school in sporting and musical events.

Traditional concerts, celebrations and fund raising will continue within both sites until the completion of the new school building. However, there will also be opportunities for the children from both sites to work together on areas such as singing, school council meetings and educational visits.

In July it was announced by the Welsh Assembly Government that a

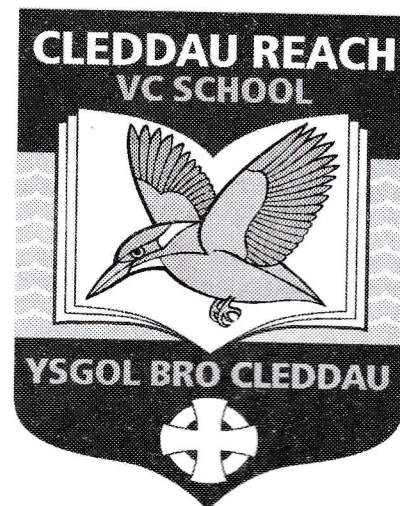
grant of £4.2 million had been

awarded towards the construction of a new area school within Llangwm. It is anticipated that work on the new school building will begin in the Autumn of 2011 and that work will be completed at some point before Easter 2013. The new school building will provide a high quality modern building with the latest technology and a stimulating learning environment for children.

Local artist Graham Brace has helped the school to develop a design for our new school badge. Graham looked at some of the ideas developed by the children and discussed some of the things that would be important in establishing the identity of the new school.

Using his knowledge of the local area and his skills as an artist he has designed a modern and striking design for the new badge. Graham explained the completed design in the following way: 'I wanted to establish a simple but meaningful approach to the design and one that would establish a strong and individual identity for the new school. I have tried to give the badge a unifying aspect that connects all three communities by focusing on the Cleddau estuary which is simply represented on the badge by a blue band through the centre.

The open book represents learning – the read and written word and pictorial aspect. Leaping from the pages of the book is a kingfisher – a species that is strongly representative of the Cleddau Estuary as well as inland brooks and streams. It is an iconic, beautiful, colourful, distinctive and exciting bird and one that is easily identified and unmistakable. This establishes a bright and optimistic image and symbolises the vibrancy of school life and the excitement of education in the early and primary years. The cross signifies the school's strong link with the local churches. Finally, I have used a simple, bold sans-serif typeface that will ensure ease of readability and reproduction at all sizes and uses.'



The Governing Body of the school have approved the new design and thanked Graham Brace for the time and thought he has given to this task. It is felt that the badge successfully provides a new and positive identity for Cleddau Reach V.C. Primary school.

This term staff have provided after school clubs in the following areas football, rugby, netball, running, and environmental issues.



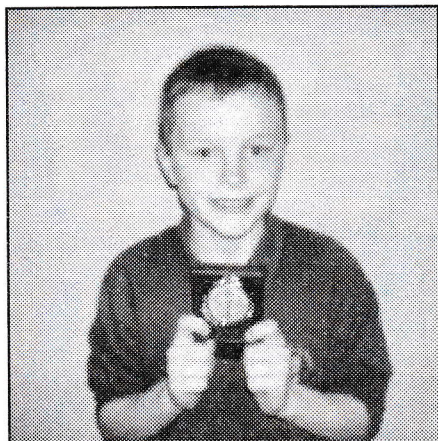


## Tag Rugby

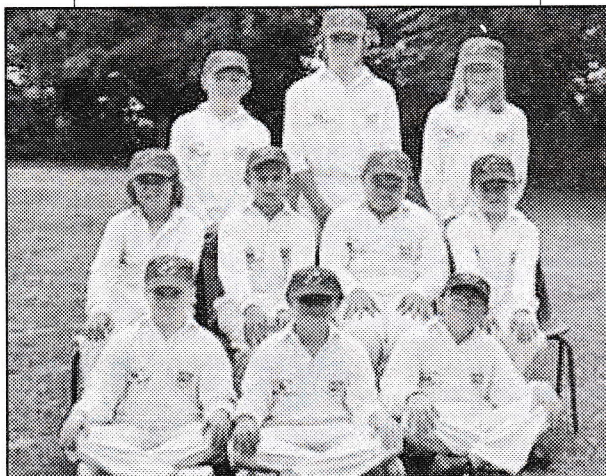
Jamie belongs to the Welsh Squad and is very busy training for the Welsh National Competition being

## Great River Race:

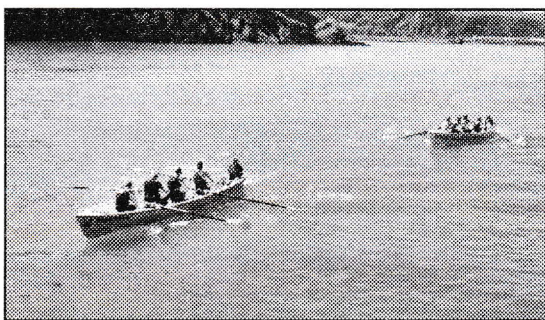

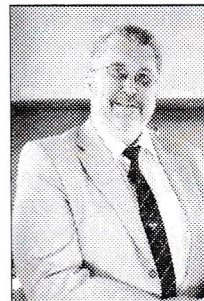
